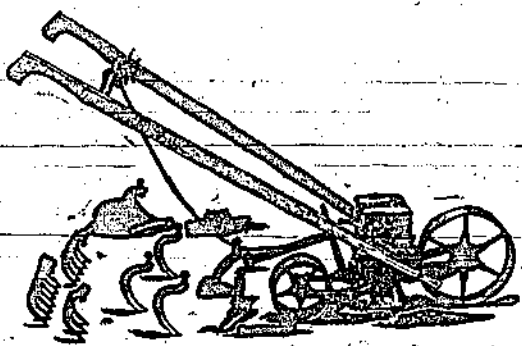

The State Board of Education on Monday last apportioned to the several counties of the state the amount each will receive out of the money to be raised through the state school tax. This money represents the five dollars for each child of school age, and aggregates in round numbers \$2,250,000.

The money is apportioned to the counties on a basis of their ratables, with the exception that a small amount is taken from two or three of the larger counties to assist two or three of the rural counties, where the ratables are not so high in proportion to the number of children.

This apportionment will also form the basis of the distribution of the \$813,000 appropriated from the State treasury to aid in reducing the state school tax. This appropriation will provide 35 per cent of the above tax,—being equivalent to a reduction in the tax rate of 10 10 on each \$100.

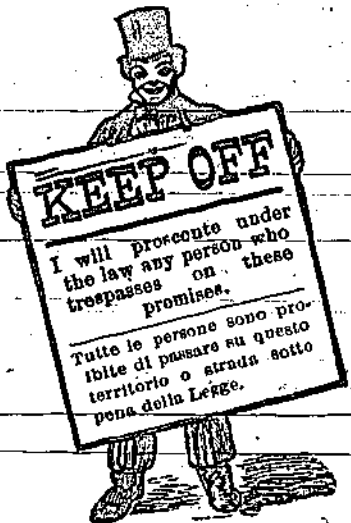

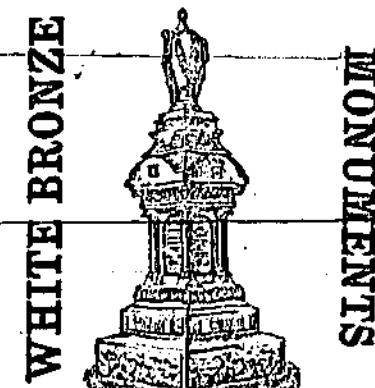

The Health Resort.

A public meeting of citizens was held on Wednesday evening last, in Firemen's Hall, to further advance the movement to promote the interests of Hammononton, particularly as a health resort. Chas. Woodnutt was Chairman, and Orville E. Hoyt, Sec.

It was resolved to form a permanent organization for the purpose named, and the following temporary articles of association adopted:

1. The name of this association shall be the Health Resort Association.

2. The objects of this association shall be to use every legitimate means to advance the prosperity of Hammononton, by encouraging capitalists to locate their industries in the town, and to induce the building of houses for the accommodation of visitors or for manufacturing purposes; and by judicious advertising make known to those who are seeking a place of residence, or for the investment of capital, the advantages Hammononton offers.

3. The officers shall be a President, two Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and an Executive Committee to consist of the above officers and six other members.

3. Regular meetings shall be held on the second Wednesday evening in each month.

President, R. J. Byrne.
First Vice, H. H. Henshaw.
Second Vice, Chas. Woodnutt.
Secretary, Dr. C. Cunningham.
Treasurer, Dr. J. A. Wans.
Ex. Com., The officers named, and Messrs. Robert Steel, Wm. Colwell, E. W. Batchelor, George Elvins, Elam Stockwell, W. L. Black, and Dr. W. E. Peck.

Committees on Publication, Constitution, Finance, and Medical Literature were appointed.

There was considerable discussion as to the best mode of procedure, and finally decided that articles published in medical magazines should be supplemented by the circulation of ten thousand booklets containing views of Hammononton, with "descriptive" text and recital of the natural advantages possessed for rest and recuperation, or for permanent residence.

Executive Committee will meet at Dr. C. Cunningham's residence this [Saturday] evening.

In a couple of weeks, President McKinley will begin his transcontinental tour in company with a majority of the members of his cabinet; and from May 1st to June 15th, barring unexpected contingencies, the executive branch of the United States Government will be conducted on wheels. Going to the Pacific coast by the southern route, the President and his party will cover 10,000 miles in their travels, and they will experience practically every type of American climate, from the warmth of New Orleans to the cool breezes that blow along the great lakes; while the sights which they view will include Southern plantations, Western prairie farms, alkali deserts, the towering ranges of the Rockies, and the busy life of San Francisco and the thriving, progressive cities of the inland West. No other country on the face of the globe can show such a variety of products, handicrafts, and climatic conditions as those which the tourists will witness before their train steams back into the National Capital.
