Our Town Marshal.

The new Town Marshal, Mr. C. E. Roberts, has set an example by endeavoring to do his duty, and it is hoped that every citizen will assist him. Should Mr. Roberts be compelled to perform some disagreeable work, he should be thanked, not scolded; for if the law is enforced strictly it will be to the advantage of all. Every individual who violates the law makes it more difficult for others, and if the law is violated unintentionally some allowance should be made for the Marshal, as he does not know the good from the bad, and is compelled to treat all alike. Should the Marshal notify you that you are not complying with the law, remember that he was selected to do such work, and while discharging his duty he deserves your aid as a law-abiding citizen. We now have a good Marshal; let us assist him.

Bicyclists are informed that it is unlawful to ride on the sidewalks. Of course one cannot ride in the mud during extremely wet weather, but these things can be judged by common sense. The best rule to adopt is to draw the line on wheeled vehicles. No bicycle should go on any sidewalk that is not given up to other vehicles.

There is as much danger to pedestrians on sidewalks, from bicycles, as from bugles, and people do not intend to be "rung off" the sidewalks with a demand. Last week an elderly lady was injured by a sidewalk scooter, and another was sent into the hedge, — both on Bellevue, — the riders not even stopping to learn whether they had killed anyone or not.

We either have law, or people have no sidewalks, and no security from danger. The State has made laws, and so has the Town, and it is proposed to enforce them.

For the benefit of those who prefer to make their own laws, instead of obeying those of State and Town, it may be mentioned that the Marshal has orders to arrest all persons riding on the sidewalks. Any member of Council, justice, or constable can also make arrests when he sees the violation. Any citizen can report cases and have arrests made. There is a committee of Council whose duty it is to see that the law is strictly enforced.

The best thing for us all is to endeavor to avoid the necessity of making any arrests, as better protection to the community will result. In other words, every citizen should consider that he has a duty to perform as a citizen, and should set an example to others.
