On Wednesday evening the two committees met and laid plans which will be made public soon. It will require much hustling, but the desired building can be secured if our citizens will meet the joint building committee half-way.

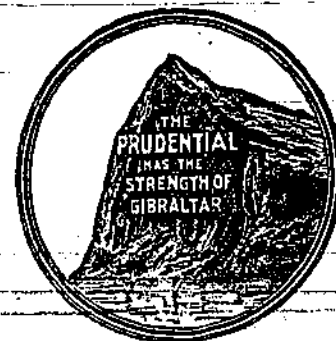

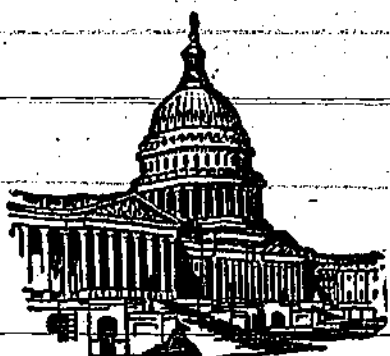
A four legged chicken, hatched
