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

## Town Council Meeting.

Every member deserved a medal,  
Wednesday evening, as the chairs  
were all occupied.

The Highway Committee advised  
that care should be taken in the  
expenditure of money for rebuilding  
roads, or there will be a shortage in  
that fund. One short piece, on  
Valley Avenue, from Broadway to  
Central, required turnpiking and  
filling, and Council approved of  
their recommendation to have it  
done.

Bills ordered paid totalled up as  
follows:

Highways	188.00
Fire	18.41
Drainage	22.50
Sewerage	2.00

A letter from Drexel & Co. stated  
that they hold one of the old Mulli-  
ca Township bonds, issued in 1861,  
while Hammoncton was part of  
Mullica. It was for five hundred  
dollars, and the Company desired  
a settlement. The subject was re-  
ferred to Solicitor Stockwell.

Law and Order Committee was  
authorized to employ two special  
officers, at not to exceed three dol-  
lars per day, ten hours at thirty-  
cents per hour.

Liberty Loan Publicity Commit-  
tee were given permission to place  
posters in Council Chamber, con-  
taining list of subscriptions to loan.
