Monfort and others are complainants, and "Fruit Growers' Union and Co-operative Society, Limited," is defendant, the subscriber, the Receiver appointed in said cause, will expose to sale at public vendue, on the premises, in the Town of Hammonton, Atlantic County, New Jersey, on

Wednesday, May 3rd, 1899,

at three o'clock in the afternoon, The real estate of the defendant corporation, free and clear of the incumbrance of two mortgages thereon, one bearing date the 14th day of April, 1894, recorded at May's Landing in Book 36 of Mortgages, page 354, &c., for seventy five hundred and six dollars and eighteen cents; the other bearing date the 28th day of August, 1897, recorded at May's Landing, in Book 47 of mortgages, page 133, &c., for twenty nine hundred and sixty eight dollars and nineteen cents, which real estate is all situate in the Town of Hammonton, in the County of Atlantic, New Jersey, and is described as follows:

First.
