### Town Council Meeting.

A special meeting was held on  
Wednesday evening, called by the  
Mayor. All present.

Clerk read a circular from the  
Secretary of State, containing two  
or three sections from the new elec-  
tion law, which require Council to  
"immediately" redistrict the Town  
where four hundred or more votes  
have been cast in any precinct.

As Committee of the Whole,  
with Mr. Sharpe presiding, Council  
discussed the matter thoroughly,  
and decided that a division into  
four precincts was advisable, both  
present precincts having cast over  
four hundred votes.

It was considered necessary to  
canvass the latest registry books,  
to determine the boundary lines of  
new precincts; and as this could  
not be done in an evening, the  
Clerk was authorized to employ a  
man (preferably an assessor) to  
assist in locating voters, and report  
at a later meeting. The division  
must be made by ordinance, and  
completed by May 15th. Such an  
ordinance will have to be intro-  
duced at next regular meeting, on  
May 10th, and be passed within  
five days thereafter.

Subject of watchmen at various  
railroad crossings introduced, and  
Mr. Sharpe instructed to take up  
the matter with proper officials.

A letter was read from E. A.  
Stevens, State Road Commissioner,  
enclosing specifications for such  
improvement of Main Road and  
Bellevue Av. as he would approve,  
and suggesting that Council pro-  
cure estimate of cost. Referred to  
Highway Committee, who will try  
to push the business.

Adjourned at 9.48.

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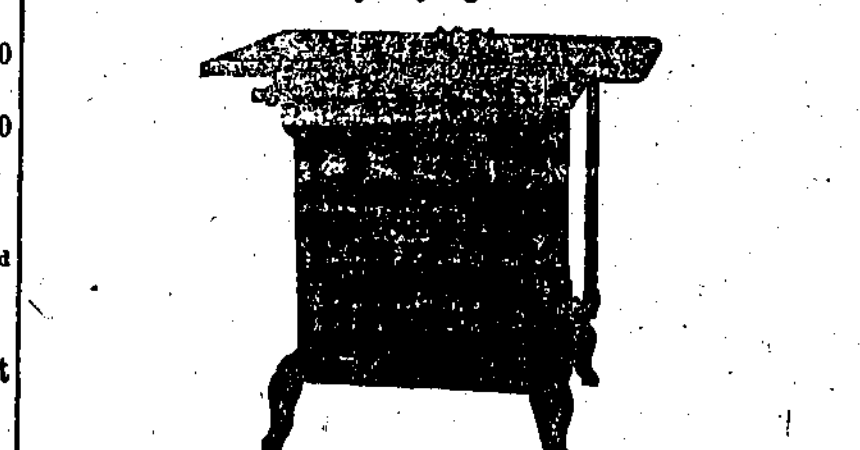

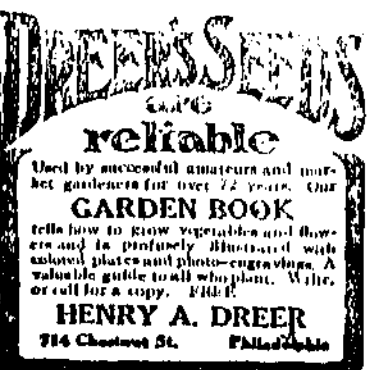

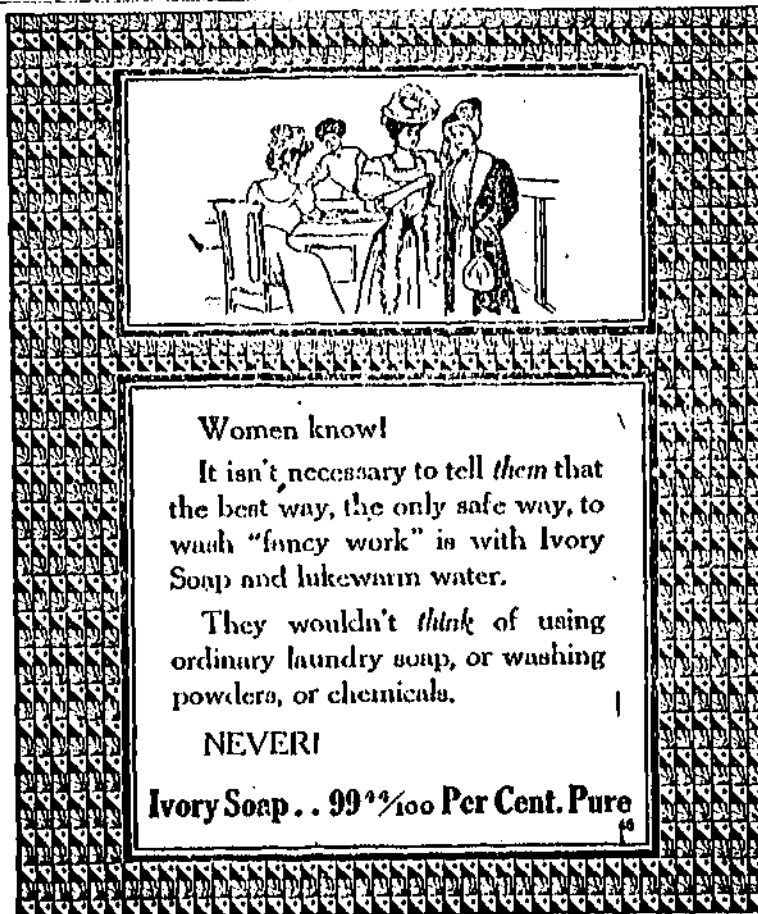
