The Bicycle Question.

MR. EDITOR: Our friend Jacobs seems to have a hard time of it. It looks as if he was the only active member on the Law and Order Committee, and with your kind permission I would like to assist him a little. He reminds me of the boy who "stood on the burning deck."

He says that our new Town Marshal has set an example by endeavoring to do his duty. Does he mean to insinuate that our other officials have failed to do their duty? For instance, when our Council enacts a law that its own members violate with impunity, does he think they have failed to do their duty when they violate it, or when they make a law that they themselves cannot keep? I hope that Brother Jacobs will consider the extremely low salary paid some of our officials, and not be too harsh on them. Have charity, Jacobs, have charity.

He says that last week an elderly lady was injured by a sidewalk scorch. It seems to me that here is a golden opportunity for the Marshal to exercise his skill and bring the offender to justice. Most every one knows that during the past winter a majority of bicycle riders have used the sidewalks, right in the face of an unjust law.

I would suggest to Council that no bicyclist, while riding on the sidewalk, shall ride within fifty feet of any pedestrian. I think this would be very ample, and so just that every citizen

would take a pride in seeing that it was enforced, and save the friends of the Marshal, who do not wish to offend him, the trouble of keeping their eyes peeled when innocently using the sidewalks without disturbing pedestrians, who undoubtedly have first right to their use, but who should have no objections to bicycles using them if they would keep well away.

Let us hear from some one else, and see what public opinion really is.

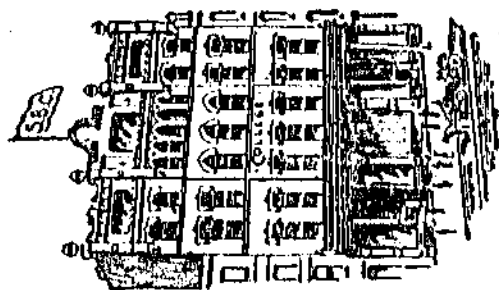


