A Democratic paper in Boston laments the fact that "the popular interest in Presidential candidates is confined to one party, no one even proposing a Democratic nominee." The reason for this state of affairs is that from present appearances the Democratic nomination will not be worth having, and nearly everybody so regards it. Under the circumstances, therefore, it is not surprising that only Republican candidates are being talked of.

The Gold Dollar Saloon, of Buffalo, said to be one of the handsomest drinking places in the United States, is to be converted into a temperance saloon. The proprietor is tired of selling liquor, and will be put in charge of the new enterprise. The floor of the place is laid with \$20 gold pieces, the bar is studded with \$50 gold pieces, the walls are hung with fine pictures, and it is furnished with 1200 incandescent lights.

S., as well as the wage earners whom they employ, will learn with interest that we imported at New York, during the first half-year's operation of the new tariff, 1,520,000 pounds more of C. Regular meeting of Town Council last Saturday evening, April 27th. Present: Messrs. Bernhouse, Little, Patton, Joslyn, Adams.  
 Minutes of last meeting read, corrected and approved.  
 Petition received from thirteen business men, asking that bucksters and peddlers who are not residents of the Town be required to pay a license fee for the privilege of doing business here. Referred to Ordinance Committee.  
 A Committee of the Hammonon Cycle and Athletic Club, with Prof. H. E. Salisbury as chairman, presented draft of a bicycle ordinance which they asked Council to enact, presenting arguments in its favor. First reading and laid over one month, as required by law.

On motion, voted that Overseer of Highways be authorized to purchase necessary supplies for his work.

Voted, that Mr. Garton be continued as night watchman for six months, at \$1.50 per week.

Voted, that printed forms be procured for highway bills, to be arranged by Overseer and Printing Committee.

Mr. Fowler asked permission to remove certain trees in the Park. Voted that Council visit the Park in a body next Monday, and there decide the matter.

Chairman Bernhouse read correspondence between himself and manufacturers of chemical fire engines, and exhibited pictures and catalogues received. After consideration, voted that the Chairman and Fire Marshal Brown be a committee to investigate the matter and purchase an engine, the cost not to exceed the amount appropriated by town meeting, \$1400.

Constables Geo. Bernhouse and Ben. Fogelto presented their bonds for \$1000 which were accepted.

On motion, M. L. Jackson was granted permission to obstruct Second Street while moving his market building. Adjourned.

Sunday School workers of Buena Vista Township held a meeting last Wednesday evening, in the M. E. Church at Richland. A lively song service was led by Rev. A. Jagers, Pastor of the Newtonville M. E. Church. Rev. Geo. D. Jones, former pastor of Richland M. E. Church, gave a brief word of welcome, and being Township Secretary, acted as Moderator for the evening. Reports were then called for from the various schools, to which thirty-six delegates responded, representing seven of the thirteen schools in the Township. After a brief explanation of Township organization by State Secretary Rev. E. M. Ferguson, it was unanimously voted to organize, and the following officers were elected:

President, C. A. Gross, Landisville.  
 1st V. P., Jos. Aspinwall, Cedar Lk.  
 2nd V. P., B. C. Cake, Landisville.  
 Recording Sec., Chas. Wray, Buena.  
 Cor. Sec., Rev. G. D. Jones, Richland.

A brief address followed on "Helpful Hints for Building Up a Sunday School" by Edw. E. L. Tice, County Secretary; followed by an address by Rev. E. M. Ferguson, on "Serviceable Teaching," after which the meeting closed with the Doxology.

The bicycle club, which has changed its name from "Hammonon Cycle and Athletic Club" to "Hammonon Athletic Association," has had the track at the Park scraped, rolled and put in good condition for the use of members of the Association. In the future, the club will be known as the "H. A. A.," instead of "H. C. & A. C."

**The following is the State dog law, now in force, published by vote of Town Council:**

1. Be enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That every person who shall own, keep or harbor any dog, bitch or bitchess shall have the same registered and numbered with the clerk of the township, borough, or city in which the owner or person harboring the same shall reside, and shall place upon the neck of each dog or bitch kept or harbored a collar, having engraved thereon, upon a metal surface, the name of the owner of said dog or bitch and the registered number thereof, and it shall be lawful for any person to kill any dog or bitch found straying off the owner's premises without such collar upon its neck.

2. And be it enacted, That it shall be the duty of each township, borough or city in this state to provide a book for the purpose of registering the owner's name of every dog or bitch and the number, numbering them in the order of the owners applying for said registration, and giving to each person information of the registered number thereof, the person applying for registration shall pay the sum of one dollar for each dog or bitch thus registered, of which the clerk shall receive twelve cents for each registration, the balance to be applied to paying damage done by dogs to domestic animals or poultry, after the same shall have been appraised by two freeholders, as authorized and directed by the act to which this is a supplement and the expenses to said act, and in case there is no damage, such balance to become a part of the general fund of such township, borough or city, as the case may be.

3. And be it enacted, That in case the clerk of any township, borough or city shall neglect or refuse to register any dog or bitch which application shall be made to him for that purpose, he shall forfeit and pay the sum of ten dollars for each refusal, which shall be paid to the treasurer of the township, city or borough as hereby authorized and empowered, and whose duty it shall be to appoint one or more persons in their respective cities, towns or townships with full power and authority to kill any dog, male or female, found straying off the owner's premises without such collar as above provided for upon its neck.

4. And be it enacted, That the common council of any incorporated city or town and the township committee of any township are hereby authorized and empowered to order and whose duty it shall be to appoint one or more persons in their respective cities, towns or townships with full power and authority to kill any dog, male or female, found straying off the owner's premises without such collar as above provided for upon its neck.

5. And be it enacted, That the common council of any incorporated city or town and the township committee of any township are hereby authorized and empowered to order and whose duty it shall be to appoint one or more persons in their respective cities, towns or townships with full power and authority to kill any dog, male or female, found straying off the owner's premises without such collar as above provided for upon its neck.

6. And be it enacted, That the provisions of this act shall not apply to office dogs of the first or second class in this state.

7. And be it enacted, That the provisions of this act shall be construed to repeal the provisions of any law now in existence providing for the taxing of dogs.

8. And be it enacted, That all acts or parts of acts inconsistent with the provisions of this act be and the same are hereby repealed, and that this act shall take effect immediately.
