Mr. and Mrs. Wescoat were cut by broken glass. Coroner Franks held an inquest on Tuesday. The verdict was substantially accidental death, exonerating Mr. Wescoat.




**The Greatest Disaster.**

in Rochester. Clinton N. Howard

"The Titanic goes down, with  
1600 souls aboard, and the world  
stops to shudder and weep. Con-  
gress appoints a committee to in-  
vestigate, to locate the responsibil-  
ity for the disaster and bring the  
guilty to justice, and a hundred  
new regulations, laws and reforms  
are proposed to protect travelers  
upon the high seas from the dan-  
gers of the iceberg. No one could  
wish to minimize this world's great  
disaster, that sent 1600 lives down  
into the great deep; but they went  
down with the flag flying, lights  
burning, and the band playing  
'Nearer, my God, to thee.'  
"One hundred thousand souls,  
year by year, go down in the black  
sea of drink, rotted, poisoned, mur-  
dered in cold blood by the liquor  
traffic, with the black flag unfurled,  
lights out, drums muffled, with all  
the bands in hell playing the dead  
march in sin, and the world does  
not weep, and the world does not  
lose its sleep, and go investigating  
committee is appointed, and no cry  
for justice is heard in the halls at  
Washington. The press, like dumb  
dogs that dare not bark, is muzzled

the Church dynamite the saloon."


