## Water Committee's Report.

To the President and Members of the Town Council of Hammonton:

Your Committee on Fire, Water and Light met, at the residence of Councilman Boyer, Tuesday evening, April 25th, as per call of the chairman, to consider the different proposals submitted for supplying the town with water.

In order that a thorough investigation be made of the different propositions, and in order that an impartial decision in the matter might be made, section after section was taken up in the different propositions, and compared. As per order of Council, your committee received bids up until the close of April 26th, giving all comers a chance to compete.

In the Dunn proposition we find the clause that the capital stock (\$75,000) shall be divided up into 1500 shares at \$50 each. Your committee interpret that to mean that the subscription books would be left open to any person not represented in the company to secure one or more shares should they so desire. This your committee decided was a point in favor of the Dunn proposition, as it was not included in the Day and the Campbell propositions, which were also under consideration.

In another section, the Dunn asks for a perpetual but not an exclusive franchise; but this is omitted in the Campbell and the Day propositions, they merely stating that the matter would be done according to law. In this section there is no particular advantage of the one over the other, in the opinion of your committee, from the fact that we believe the law does not sanction a perpetual franchise, and that the right for the town to purchase the plant at the expiration of ten years, should it be so desired, waives all exclusiveness in the matter.

In another section, the Dunn offers to supply water for the use of the town, other than fire purposes, at one-half the minimum rate at which water at any time is supplied to private consumers. No such offer being made in the other propositions, the committee credit the Dunn with another point.

In another section, the Dunn people offer fire-plug service at \$19 per plug per annum. The Campbell people offer the same rate, while the Day proposition quotes \$20. There is no advantage of the one company over the other in these terms, excepting in that of the Day, and therefore no point is scored.

In another section, the Dunn, the Campbell, and the Day propositions agree on spigot service for consumers, viz: \$8 per annum for first spigot, \$1 per annum for each additional spigot.

In another section, the Dunn makes a meter rate of \$8 for each 18,000 galls. or fraction thereof; \$10 for each 30,000 or fraction thereof above 18,000 gallons. The Campbell merely cites \$10 for 30,000 gallons per annum. Therefore, your committee decided that this was another point in favor of the Dunn.

Another section, both the Dunn and the Campbell propositions state that work will be commenced within two months after the passage of this resolution, and shall have the plant completed within nine months after the date of the passage thereof.

In another section, both the Dunn and the Campbell propositions state that the plant will be complete only after 4 1/2 miles of pipe are laid and ready for service. The Day proposition states but 4 miles.

In another section, the Dunn offers to make extension to the existing pipes and mains whenever the revenue to be derived therefrom shall return an equivalent net revenue of 7 per cent. on cost of said extension. The Campbell agrees to do the same when the revenue for such extension shall net the company 8 per cent. This adds another point to the Dunn proposition.

In another section, both the Dunn and the Campbell propositions offer to give the town the option of purchasing the plant after ten years, should the town so desire,—the terms to be settled by arbitration.

In another section both the Dunn and the Campbell people offer to furnish bonds for the faithful carrying out of the terms of this resolution. In the Day proposition, a bond of \$20,000 is offered.

In another section, the Campbell agrees to maintain a pressure of not less than 35 pounds to the square inch at surface of the highest point of ground where the pipes may be laid. The Dunn makes no reference to the pressure. In the opinion of your committee, this is a strong point in favor of the Campbell, and one which should be carefully looked after in creating the ordinance.

Summing it all up, the Dunn proposition offers four advantages over the others,—

1. Issuing shares of stock.
2. Furnishing water for town purposes, other than fire, at one-half the minimum rate to private consumers.
3. Cheaper meter rates.
4. Cheaper rate of interest for extension of line.

The Campbell claims a point in stating amount of pressure.

Thus, it will be seen that the Dunn proposition excels the Campbell by a score of 4 to 1; and the Day proposition being incomplete in a number of points, could not be further considered.

Upon a vote being taken, Mr. Boyer voted in favor of the Dunn proposition; Mr. DePuy undecided, favoring both; Mr. Batchelor for Dunn.

### Town Council Meeting.

Regular meeting on Saturday evening, April 29th. All members present. Minutes of last regular and special meetings read and approved.

Highway Committee reported that S. E. Brown & Co. had contract to supply terra cotta pipe, but had delivered none yet. Committee had notified property owners on lower Bellevue to repair or remove curbing. Were negotiating for purchase of gravel by load or to buy the land.

Fire, Water, and Light Committee reported electric lights improved. Made an exhaustive report upon the several bids or propositions to supply water: had three meetings, compared propositions by sections, and decided that the Thos. A. Dunn Co.'s proposition was by several points the best for Hammoncton. They had secured an expert to advise them and aid them in securing the best service possible. Report accepted.

A. J. Rider claimed four dollars for shoveling snow on street. Referred back, the work not having been authorized.

Residents on Atison Road asked that road be improved. Referred.  
Letter from Skinner & Son, manufacturers of "inspired glass," in reference to removal to Hammoncton—located at the old shoe factory. On motion, referred to the Hammoncton L. & B. Association.

Ordinance requiring safety gates passed second reading.  
Solicitor reported that final adjustment of the F. G. U. affairs would be made soon—and Receiver is expecting an order to pay taxes in arrears.  
Solicitor reported Depositor's license application irregular, and returned to him.

Solicitor stated that Collector could take his percentage from money collected. Referred to Finance Committee.  
Statement made that Hammoncton is entitled to another member of the County Board of Freeholders, under a recent law. J. H. Parkhurst was unanimously elected, to serve until March next.

Ordinance introduced and passed first reading, providing that dogs must be licensed, and muzzled during July and August.  
Water question introduced. After explanations and debate, it was voted to grant the franchise to the "Hammoncton Water Company," as incorporated by Cyrus Jones, Geo. Horn, Chas. A. Dunn, Thos. A. Dunn, N. G. Ritter, J. F. Crandall, B. E. Brown and J. Monfort. The vote was four to one—Mr. DeJoy voted in the negative.

An ordinance in regard with this franchise was introduced and passed first reading.  
Jos. H. Garion was re-elected night Marshal for one year, salary, four dollars per week.  
Governor of Highways recommended that the W. J. & S. R. Co. be notified to repair curbing at Orchard and Pleasant Streets. So voted.

Wm. H. Hammoncton asked permission to run a side-track across Pleasant St., into his yard. Referred to Highway Committee with power to act.  
Adjourned.

In Athletic Englishman Has a Number of New Ideas.

E. W. Barton-Wright is an Englishman who has introduced some new features of the art of self-defense. Mr. Barton-Wright's extraordinary resource in meeting every household kind of attack was exemplified in a most remarkable manner at a performance before several accredited witnesses, which took place a few weeks ago. On this occasion Mr. Cliphase, who as the amateur champion of the Cumberland and Westmoreland style of wrestling is almost as well known by name in this country as he is in England, made many attempts to overcome Mr. Barton-Wright's defense, all of which were unsuccessful. By way of experiment Mr. Cliphase was allowed to seize him by one leg to prove whether, with this advantage, he could throw him over backwards. This, however, as it may seem, Mr. Barton-Wright apparently without the slightest exertion threw his opponent at once and disengaged himself. Then he stood with both feet together and allowed

Mr. Cliphase to seize him by both knees. In spite, however, of this handicap Mr. Barton-Wright succeeded in extricating himself and throwing his opponent instantaneously. He then allowed himself to be seized from behind, with his arms pinned to his side, but again he threw his opponent at once upon his back. Perhaps his most remarkable feat was to allow an English amateur champion, standing with his back to him, to seize his shoulders and seize him by the neck and head, and with this hold throw him right over his head. But while in the air Mr. Barton-Wright grasped Mr. Cliphase in such a way which, owing to the speed with which it was performed, it was impossible for the eye to follow, and although apparently thrown himself he had, by the time he reached the ground, thrown his opponent and was kneeling over him. Many other feats just as extraordinary were also performed on this occasion, apparently without an effort. Mr. Cliphase's opinion as an expert was not to be denied. He says: "In spite of my being a much heavier man than Mr. Barton-Wright, his system of defense and retaliation is so much more scientific than my style that, when practicing with him, how great a gain may be my determination to remain firm on my legs and to keep my balance, my efforts are invariably frustrated and I am 'up' unceremoniously. Most strength has been of no use in withstanding the science of this new art."

Some of Mr. Barton-Wright's new methods of defense are explained by him as follows: There is an excellent method of forcing an underhanded person out of your room. It will be found particularly useful in case he should attempt to strike you. You seize your opponent by the left wrist or left hand with your left hand, holding your right hand toward your face from a blow. Pull him towards you with your left arm, without altering the position of your legs. Then turn upon your heels and pass your right arm over his left arm.

You then pass your right hand under his left forearm, and lock his arm by seizing your own wrist. Finally, by straightening both your arms, you are able to exert such leverage and to

throw such a blow upon his chest that you could knock him down or attempt to do so. Moreover, if the leverage is exerted in the proper way, it will also be found that it is quite impossible for your opponent to hit you or to retaliate in any way.

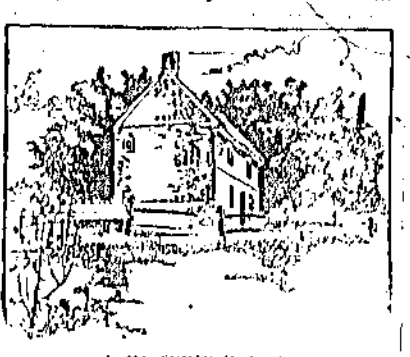

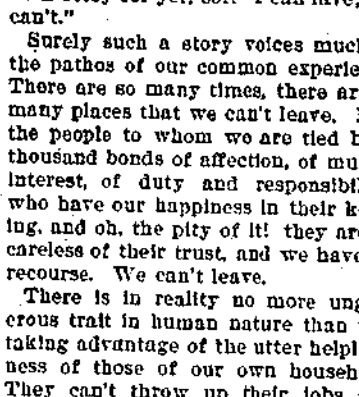

GOMEZ CARRERA.

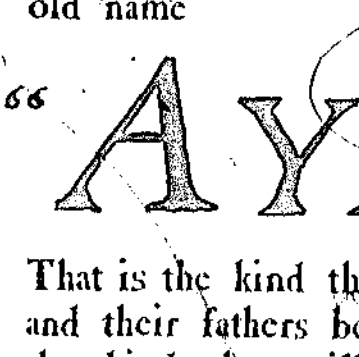
