The Water Question.

MR. EDITOR: I think it my duty to call the attention of the public to the water franchise that was granted by Council last Saturday night.

The water committee of council stated that they were in favor of the proposition that was for the best interest of the town, and then proceeded to recom-

mend the most expensive one. (Wonder it they consider themselves the town.) One proposition was to furnish the

town 30 fire-plugs at \$19 each per year ; and where not otherwise specified, that means water for all purposes taken from the pluge. The proposition accepted offered to furnish water for fire purposes only for \$19 per plug, and for all public purposes one-half meter rates, or \$5 for 30,000 gallons, \$1 for 6000 gals. What does that mean when we want to sprinkle the streets, which the business people on Bellevue would do if we had plenty of water ?

It takes about twenty thousand gals. to sprinkle one mile, and we would want it dope twice per day for at least one hundred days in a year. Now, if we should want to sprinkle the whole four and a-half miles of streets through which they propose to lay their pipe, it would cost 20,000 x 44 x 100 x 2 equals 18,000,000 divided by 6000 equals \$3000 per year. Everybody thought George Pfeiffer, Jr., got a snap on the Dutch at Egg Harbor City because they pay \$40 per plug; but what will they think us Yaukees, who grant a franchise the rate of \$119 per plug ? \$3000 div ded by 30 plugs equals \$100 each fo street sprinkling, and \$19 for fire pa poses equals \$119. And the only Cou cilman to raise his voice to vote again this gigantic steal was Mr. DePuy.

An ordinance was introduced an passed first reading, which makes n provision for the town buying the plan at any time, and with no limit to th time the franchise is to run. But believe a state law limits the time to twenty-five years. If before the expiration of that time we should desire to sprinkle thirty miles of streets (and that is not impossible), we would have to pay this company \$21,200 for water to do it with.

Tax-payers, what do you think of it ? I hope some patriotic citizen or citizens will come forward and take the matter into Court, and prevent the town from being placed in the hands of this monstrous octopus.

. It has been stated that we were not making a contract to take any of the pluge (which is true), and that when we desire to take water we can make our own terms. Did you over know a corporation to give up a good thing when once granted them? Some of us old citizens remember the thousands of dollars it cost the people of New Jersey to get rid of the franchise granted to the old Camden & Amboy R. R.


