A Week of Fires.

The first alarm since last issue
was at 7.45 last Saturday morning,
a chimney blaze at Pete Rizzotte's,
away up on Pine Road. There
was no damage.

A quiet call for help was given
on Sunday, at Tony Eskow's, on
First Road; and the neighbor's
cared for it.

The big bell rang at five o'clock
Monday afternoon, and the firemen
found a lively blaze on the roof of
Wigglesworth's barn, Washington
Street,—the same place where they
were called a few days before. A
few minutes with chemicals and
hose chilled the flames.

Just before this alarm, several
men extinguished an incipient fire
on the Stockwell coal yard fence.
Evidently, these buildings are too
near the railroad; or the Reading is
not sufficiently careful.

About 1.30 yesterday morning,
the boys were called out again,—
a barn at W. J. Elliott, Sr.'s place,
at Rosedale, was burned.

The same day, about one p.m.,
John Hey's chicken house and
other outbuildings took fire, proba-
bly from a bonfire near by, burning
them down, and endangering the
house. The chemical engine did
good work.

The firemen were hustled away
from here by a false alarm from
up-town somewhere.
