## Bicycles and Town Council.

Mr. Fowler's sentiments are mine. If every bicycle rider would dismount and pass pedestrians, no difficulty would exist; but law only will convince the "hog" that others have rights, hence "birds that can sing and won't sing must be made to sing."

One of our justices has taken it upon himself to "expound" the law. It seems to me that this duty is to enforce all laws, leaving the defeated party to appeal and get a Court decision. It is absolutely necessary to have the sidewalks protected for pedestrians, and all quibbling about what constitutes a sidewalk is confusing, as some of them have been used for thirty years or more.

## COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

Our people should attend Council meetings. At the last, some queer bills were ordered paid.

J. C. Anderson was elected to fill vacancy, and I wish to state, without four or five, that his name was used by me, and he did not seek the position. I voted for him on general principles. There was no possible chance to elect a "no license" man, and Council needed a man who knows something about town matters. The way business was done was a marvel: I never saw anything like it. Here is a sample bill, — not the exact words, but same style:

April 1, one day's work	\$1.50
" 2, " "	1.50
" 3, " "	1.50
" 4, " "	1.50

It might have been extended to 40 days' work, for all we knew. A motion was made to pay it after it was "filled out." As the bill will never come up again, no member will ever know how it is filled. Notice that the bill gives neither place nor nature of the work. Here is the law, approved April 4, 1871, p. 62:

"That it shall not be lawful for the board of chosen freeholders, or township committee, or common council, or commissioners, of any county, city, township, town, or borough, in this state, to pay or disburse out of any moneys of said county, city, township, town, or borough, to any person, unless the person claiming or receiving said moneys shall first present to the party or parties paying any such moneys a detailed bill of items or demand, specifying particularly how such bill or demand is made up, and the dates and the names of the persons to whom the amounts composing such bill or demand were severally paid, with the affidavit of the party claiming payment of said bill or demand that the same is correct."

Notice the words italicized above, — "first," "detailed," "specifying particularly," as well as "dates" and "names of parties."

There will be a special meeting of Council next Saturday evening. It would be well to come out and look on.

Perhaps, however, the bills may be in better shape. We never had a Council like this one, and ought to charge an admission fee. P. H. JACOBS.

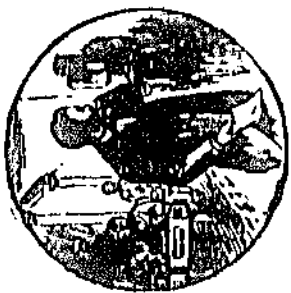
