**A N ORDINANCE to License and**  
**Regulate Inns and Taverns.**

Introduced April 24, 1897.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town  
Council of the Town of Hammonton, State of  
New Jersey, That license to inn keepers and  
tavern keepers to sell, keep, and expose for  
sale spirituous, vinous and malt liquors, may  
be granted at any regular stated meeting of  
said Town Council, and that the said Town  
Council, in granting such licenses, shall pro-  
ceed in the same manner, and be subject to  
the same provisions as the same may be law-  
fully done by the Court of Common Pleas of  
the State of New Jersey under an act entitled  
"An Act concerning Inns and Taverns," ap-  
proved April 17, 1846, and the various suppli-  
ments thereto or revisions of the same, as well  
as under such further provisions in this ordi-  
nance as may appear in the sections follow-  
ing this; Provided, however, that only one  
license for the keeping of an inn or tavern  
shall be granted for every five thousand per-  
sons in the said Town of Hammonton, which  
population shall be determined by the latest  
census of inhabitants enumerated by the State.

Sec. 2. And be it ordained, That all ap-  
plications for license shall be made in the manner  
and form as prescribed by the Act of Assem-  
bly mentioned in the first section of this ordi-  
nance, and shall be signed by at least twelve  
reputable freeholders of the Town of Hammon-  
ton, after which shall follow the affidavits of  
the applicants according to law.

Sec. 3. And be it ordained, That the Town  
Clerk of the Town of Hammonton shall, upon  
any application or application being granted  
in accordance with the several provisions of  
this ordinance, issue to each applicant a license  
to sell spirituous, vinous, and malt liquors, the  
said license also specifying that the applicant  
shall keep an inn or tavern, as provided by  
law, and subject to the provisions of this ordi-  
nance, for which license the said Town Clerk  
shall demand a fee of Five Hundred Dollars,  
which sum the said Town Clerk shall pay to  
the Collector and Treasurer of the Town of  
Hammonton within three days after receiving  
the same; said Town Clerk shall not issue any  
license granted by said Town Council until the  
said fee of five hundred dollars shall have been  
fully paid to said Town Clerk by the applicant  
to whom the license may have been granted by  
said Town Council; the said license fee of five  
hundred dollars to be appropriated by said  
Town Council to the municipal, poor, or con-  
tingent fund, or in any manner provided by  
law.

Sec. 4. And be it ordained, That no license  
shall be granted for a longer term than one  
year, and that all licenses, whenever they may  
have been granted, shall, each and every year,  
expire on the first Wednesday in June en-  
suing.

Sec. 5. And be it ordained, That should any  
licensee to keep an inn or tavern be granted by  
said Town Council after the first Wednesday  
in June of any year, the applicant receiving  
the license shall be required to pay only such  
portion of the fee of five hundred dollars as  
may be proportionate to the duration of the  
license granted, and which may expire on the  
following first Wednesday in June.

Sec. 6. And be it ordained, That no license  
issued to any inn keeper or tavern keeper  
under the provisions of this ordinance shall be  
transferred by the applicant receiving such  
license to any other party or parties without  
first obtaining the consent of the said Town  
Council, and not that unless application for  
such transfer be made at least sixty days be-  
fore such transfer is made.

Sec. 7. And be it ordained, That no license  
be provided for in this ordinance shall be  
bound to any applicant who is not a resident  
of the Town of Hammonton.

Sec. 8. And be it ordained, That all ordi-  
nances, or parts of ordinances conflicting with  
this ordinance be, and the same are hereby  
repealed.

Sec. 9. And be it ordained, That this ordi-  
nance shall go into effect immediately.

A little scholar in one of our town Sunday Schools seemed to be greatly affected by the death of little Marguerite Helm, and on Monday morning came to her mother saying: "Mamma, Miss (her teacher) told us yesterday that a woman died, I am then sent for Peter; he went into the room, sent all the folks out, then the woman's spirit returned, and she was alive. Don't you think Mr. Helm's folks ought to send for Peter?"

An Atlantic City paper attempts to smile because Hamonton pays her night marshal only \$3.50 per week. The officer referred to was employed as night watchman, and paid by business men; but it was later deemed wise to clothe him with authority to quell disturbances, make arrests, and abate the tramp nuisance; hence the commission and small addition to his salary. His remuneration, however, is not sufficient to arouse the jealousy of a banker or the envy of an editor.

Marguerite, older child of Joseph and Annie Herbert Helm, died on Friday last, at the residence of her grandmother, in Trenton, aged four years. The little one suffered for several weeks with gastritis, which finally developed into meningitis, from which there was no hope of recovery. Funeral services and burial in Hamonton, on Monday. The death of this child is made more sad by the fact that Mrs. Helm is in Philadelphia under medical treatment. The family, so well and favorably known here, have the sincere sympathy of all.

The amendments to their Constitution and By Laws recently adopted by the Volunteer Fire Company are in substance as follows:

Changes the words "Fire Marshal," wherever they occur, to "Fire Chief."

Sec. 3, Art. 2, of Constitution. The time of notice of special meeting to fill vacancies caused by death or removal from town changed to one week. Any vacancy caused by resignation shall be filled at same meeting when resignation is accepted.

Art. 7. Changes limit of membership from fifty to sixty.

By-Laws, Art. 1, Sec. 7. Makes it Foreman's duty to proceed to engine house when an alarm is sounded; to have apparatus moved at once; take command until Chief arrives; to order roll-calls and drills, and obey Chief.

Art. 3, Sec. 1. Reduces admission fee from two dollars and a half to one dollar.

Art. 4, Sec. 12. Any member moving from town and neglecting to resign within two weeks, shall be dropped from the roll by order of the President.

Art. 4, Sec. 3, added. No money received from dues or fines shall be expended for the apparatus or supplies.

When followed, they were dragging off the young collie, but he made trouble and they had to release him. The thieves disappeared in the woods. Last week they nearly cleaned out Mr. Beane's chicken house, taking what the old gentleman was depending upon for a livelihood.

The publisher of a newspaper has one thing to sell and one thing to rent. He will sell the newspaper and rent certain space in his columns. Can any one tell us why he should be expected to give away either the one or the other? If he can, if he so chooses, and he does, at times, give a great deal of space without compensation, for the public benefit; but it does not follow that he ought to be expected to do so. It ought to be recognized as a contribution, exactly as would be the giving of sugar or coffee by a grocer. But strange to say, it is not looked upon in that light by some people; yet everybody knows that the existence of the paper depends upon the rent of its space and the sale of the paper, as a merchant's success depends on selling his goods instead of giving them away.

**AN ORDINANCE** to prevent and remove all encroachments and nuisances in and upon any street or part thereof, in the Town of Hammonton.

Introduced April 24, 1897.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town of Hammonton, That it shall be unlawful to have keep, station, or stall by any means whatever, any sign, bill, or advertisement to or upon any sidewalk or public street in the Town of Hammonton; and that any person who shall violate this ordinance shall be subject to a penalty of ten dollars or imprisonment for ten days, to be assessed and recovered in manner and form as provided by Section 28 of the Town Charter.

**AN ORDINANCE** creating the office of Park Commissioners in the Town of Hammonton, and defining the powers and duties thereof.

Introduced April 24, 1897.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Town of Hammonton, that immediately after the passage of this ordinance the Town Council shall appoint three persons, residents and taxpayers of the Town of Hammonton, which body shall be denominated "The Park Commission of the Town of Hammonton."

Sec. 2. And be it ordained, That the commissioners so appointed shall serve without salary or other consideration for their services; shall hold their office, one for a term of one year, one for a term of two years, and one for a term of three years from the date of their appointment, and that there shall be appointed annually hereafter one commissioner for the full term of three years.

Sec. 3. And be it ordained, That the said commission shall have control over, and it shall be its duty to supervise the improvement and care of the Hammonton Park under such instructions as may from time to time be given by the inhabitants at the annual town meeting.

Sec. 4. And be it ordained, That the said Commission shall have power to expend any moneys that have now or may hereafter be appropriated for the purpose by the Town, or that may be derived from any leases of privileges, in the ornamentation of the grounds, the construction or repair of any buildings or wharves within the Park, or in any manner that may be required to permanently improve the property; to employ a custodian of the grounds and buildings; and to lease, for periods not exceeding one year, such portions of the grounds, for the holding of races, the establishment of refreshment or amusement stands, or the hiring of boats, providing that in no case shall such leases or privileges interfere with the free use and enjoyment of the park grove, buildings or wharves by the general public.

Sec. 5. And be it ordained, That the said Commission shall report annually to the Town Council, not more than thirty nor less than twenty days preceding the annual meeting, a statement of all monies received and expended during the current year, and an approximate estimate of the appropriation required for the succeeding year, together with such recommendations concerning the permanent improvement of the property as may seem wise and expedient.

Sec. 6. And be it ordained, That this ordinance shall take effect immediately.

**AN ORDINANCE** to prevent and prohibit the running at large of dogs in the Town of Hammonton.

Introduced April 24, 1897.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town of Hammonton, that every person residing in the Town of Hammonton who shall own, keep, or harbor any dog, bitch or bloods, shall have the same registered and numbered with the Town Clerk, and shall place upon the neck of each dog or bitch kept or harbored a collar, having engraved thereon upon a metal or other name of the owner of said dog or bitch, and the registry number thereof; and it shall be lawful for such person as may be authorized by Council for that purpose to kill any dog or bitch found straying off the owner's premises without such collar upon its neck.

Sec. 2. And be it ordained, That it shall be the duty of the Town Clerk to register the name of the owner of every dog or bitch, and the number, in a book provided for that purpose, numbering them in the order of owners applying for said registration, and giving to each person information of the registered number thereof. The person applying for registration shall pay the sum of One Dollar for each dog or bitch registered, of which the Clerk shall receive twelve cents for each registration, the balance to be applied to paying damage done by dogs to domestic animals or poultry, after the same shall have been ascertained by two freeholders as authorized and directed by an act entitled "An act for the preservation of sheep," approved April 14, 1886, and the supplements thereto; and in case there is no damage, such balance to be a part of the general fund of the town.

Sec. 3. And be it ordained, That the Pound Keeper and Town Marshal are hereby authorized and empowered to kill any dog, bitch or female, found straying off the owner's premises without such collar as above provided for on its neck.

Sec. 4. And be it ordained, That this ordinance shall take effect immediately.
