Somebody with a good memory has taken occasion to remind ex-President Cleveland and the people who read his scold at the Republican party because of its promptness in carrying out its pledges with reference to tariff legislation, of the terrible experience of the people of the United States during the 18 months in which his party delayed its tariff legislation. During that time there were more than 20,000 failures, with liabilities aggregating more than 500 million dollars; the closing down of over 800 banks; the appointment of receivers for about 40 railroads, whose indebtedness amounted to a billion and a half dollars; and strikes and lock-outs costing the workmen engaged 45 million dollars in wages lost.

The total record of those 18 months includes strikes in New York and Michigan in March, 1893; strikes in Chicago in April; strikes and bank failures in Illinois and Ohio in May; runs on savings banks in Western States in June; suspension of work in mines and numerous bank failures throughout the West in July; failures in New York and Chicago and smaller cities, followed by riots in New York, Kansas and elsewhere in August; strike on the "Big Four" and consequent riots in Sept.; railroad strike in Alabama and necessity of troops to suppress it in October; strikes on the Lehigh Valley Road and in Connecticut factories in November; riots in Pennsylvania mining region in December; strikes in New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and elsewhere, with riots, in January; strikes in New York, Ohio, Massachusetts, accompanied by riots, in February; strikes in New Jersey, West Virginia, Pennsylvania, and Colorado, accompanied by riots and use of troops to suppress violence, in March; strikes in Ohio, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Alabama, and on the Pacific coast, accompanied by riots, which were suppressed by State troops, in April; bloodshed and use of troops in Pennsylvania in May; strikes and riots in Maryland, Montana, Ohio, Alabama, Wisconsin, Pennsylvania, and Michigan, which were only suppressed by the use of troops, in June; strikes in Chicago, Indianapolis, and elsewhere, followed by use of troops, in July; strikes in New York, Massachusetts, and other Eastern States prior to final enactment of tariff law on August 28, 1894.

The commission of Japanese statesmen, after studying the question 18 months in all phases, decided to adopt the gold standard. They discovered that under the declining value of silver, the cost of living had increased 62 per cent since 1873, while wages had increased but 33 per cent. They must have laughed in their sleeves at the United States during the late campaign. Japan was being held up as the most striking example of prosperity among silver using nations, and at the same time these statesmen knew that Japan was going to adopt the gold standard because free silver was destroying her prosperity.

AN ORDINANCE to License and Regulate Inns and Taverns.

Introduced April 24, 1897.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Town of Hammonton, State of New Jersey, That licenses to inn keepers and tavern keepers to sell, keep, and expose for sale spirituous, vinous, and malt liquors, may be granted at any regular stated meeting of said Town Council, and that the said Town Council, in granting such licenses, shall proceed in the same manner, and be subject to the same provisions as the same may be lawfully done by the Court of Common Pleas of the State of New Jersey under an act entitled "An Act concerning Inns and Taverns," approved April 17, 1846, and the various supplements thereto or revisions of the same, as well as under such further provisions in this ordinance as may appear in the sections following this; Provided, however, that only one license for the keeping of an inn or tavern shall be granted for every five thousand persons in the said Town of Hammonton, which population shall be determined by the latest census of inhabitants enumerated by the State.

Sec. 2. And be it ordained, That all applications for license shall be made in the manner and form as prescribed by the Act of Assembly mentioned in the first section of this ordinance, and shall be signed by at least twelve reputable freeholders of the Town of Hammonton, after which shall follow the affidavits of the applicants according to law.

Sec. 3. And be it ordained, That the Town Clerk of the Town of Hammonton shall, upon any application or applications being granted in accordance with the several provisions of this ordinance, issue to each applicant a license to sell spirituous, vinous, and malt liquors, the said license also specifying that the applicant shall keep an inn or tavern, as provided by law, and subject to the provisions of this ordinance, for which license the said Town Clerk shall demand a fee of Five Hundred Dollars, which sum the said Town Clerk shall pay to the Collector and Treasurer of the Town of Hammonton within three days after receiving the same; said Town Clerk shall not issue any license granted by said Town Council until the said fee of five hundred dollars shall have been fully paid to said Town Clerk by the applicant to whom the license may have been granted by said Town Council; the said license fee of five hundred dollars to be appropriated by said Town Council to the incidental, poor, or contingent fund, or in any manner provided by law.

Sec. 4. And be it ordained, That no license shall be granted for a longer term than one year, and that all licenses, whenever they may have been granted, shall, each and every year, expire on the first Wednesday in June ensuing.

Sec. 5. And be it ordained, That should any license to keep an inn or tavern be granted by said Town Council after the first Wednesday in June of any year, the applicant receiving the license shall be required to pay only such portion of the fee of five hundred dollars as may be proportionate to the duration of the license granted, and which may expire on the following first Wednesday in June.

Sec. 6. And be it ordained, That no license issued to any inn keeper or tavern keeper under the provisions of this ordinance shall be transferred by the applicant receiving such license to any other party or parties without first obtaining the consent of the said Town Council, and not then unless application for such transfer be made at least sixty days before such transfer is made.

Sec. 7. And be it ordained, That no license as provided for in this ordinance shall be issued to any applicant who is not a resident of the Town of Hammonton.

Sec. 8. And be it ordained, That all ordinances, or parts of ordinances conflicting with this ordinance be, and the same are hereby repealed.

Sec. 9. And be it ordained, That this ordinance shall go into effect immediately.

Wednesday Mr. B. received a telegram announcing her death the previous night, aged 50 years, of Bright's disease. Mr. and Mrs. Boyer will attend the funeral to-day. Mrs. Alexander had visited Hammoniton several times, and made numerous friends.

The old lady of Freshkirk met on Tuesday last. The Finance Committee, in their annual report called attention to the increase of Court expenses, the small amount derived from costs in civil cases, and other matters of importance, suggesting some drastic reforms. Resolutions for the year were \$305,019.39; cash on hand, \$7,796.23. The new road from Egg Harbor City to May's Landing was reported surveyed, and its cost estimated at \$2000.

The new Board met on Wednesday, and elected Joseph H. Horton, director. \$200,000 were appropriated for county expenses. Applications for the new road were received and referred to State Commissioner Budd for approval, and the Director authorized to advertise for bids for building the same if plans are approved.

An informal meeting of the Town Council was held last Saturday evening, to locate the electric lights. It was decided to use the twenty-four arc lights - 1200 candle power - and none of the incandescents. They were located as follows:

At Twelfth Street and Reading Railroad. Twelfth Street and West R. R. Ave. Bellevue Ave. and Second St. " " and Third St. " " and Tilton St. " " and Valley Ave. " " 2 between Valley and Main. " " and Main Road. Central Ave. Third and Vine. " " and Grape St. " " three, at angles in street. Pleasant St. and West R. R. Ave. " " and Second St. " " and Third St. Orchard and Horton St. Egg Harbor Road and Vine St. Second and Peach St. Egg Harbor Road and Grape St. Twelfth St. part way to Main Road.

Wouldn't it be more satisfactory to spread these Pleasant Street lights, and put one at Fairview Avenue and Third Street? All summer, berry growers are teaming down Fairview, and many residents on Thirteenth Street and that section come into town that way. If the new Camden County road comes in by the way of Main Road, an effort will be made to have it continued down Third Street.

AN ORDINANCE to prevent and remove all encroachments and nuisances in and upon any street or any part thereof, in the Town of Hammonton.

Introduced April 24, 1897.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town of Hammonton, That it shall be unlawful to have keep, fasten, or affix by any means whatever, any sign, bill, or advertisement to or upon any shade or other tree standing on any of the sidewalks or public streets in the Town of Hammonton; and that any person who shall violate this ordinance shall be subject to a penalty of ten dollars or imprisonment for ten days, to be sued for and recovered in manner and form as provided by Section 28 of the Town Charter.

Sec. 2. And be it ordained, That this ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE creating the office of Park Commissioners in the Town of Hammonton, and defining the powers and duties thereof.

Introduced April 21, 1897.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Town of Hammonton, that immediately after the passage of this ordinance the Town Council shall appoint three persons, residents and taxpayers of the Town of Hammonton, which body shall be denominated "The Park Commission of the Town of Hammonton."

Sec. 2. And be it ordained, That the commissioners so appointed shall serve without salary or other consideration for their services; shall hold their office, — one for a term of one year, one for a term of two years, and one for a term of three years from the date of their appointment, and that there shall be appointed annually hereafter one commissioner for the full term of three years.

Sec. 3. And be it ordained, That the said commission shall have control over, and it shall be its duty to supervise the improvement and care of the Hammonton Park under such instructions as may from time to time be given by the inhabitants at the annual town meeting.

Sec. 4. And be it ordained, That the said Commission shall have power to expend any moneys that have now or may hereafter be appropriated for the purpose by the Town, or that may be derived from any source of privilege, in the ornamentation of the grounds, the construction or repair of any buildings or wharves within the Park, or in any manner that may be required to permanently improve the property; to employ a custodian of the grounds and buildings; and to lease, for periods not exceeding one year, such portions of the grounds, for the holding of races, the establishment of refreshment or amusement stands, or the hiring of boats, providing that in no case shall such lease or privileges interfere with the free use and enjoyment of the park grove, buildings or wharves by the general public.

Sec. 5. And be it ordained, That the said Commission shall report annually to the Town Council, not more than thirty nor less than twenty days preceding the annual meeting, a statement of all moneys received and expended during the current year, and an approximate estimate of the appropriation required for the succeeding year, together with such recommendations concerning the permanent improvement of the property as may seem wise and expedient.

Sec. 6. And be it ordained, That this ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE to prevent and prohibit the running at large of dogs in the Town of Hammonton.

Introduced April 24, 1897.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town of Hammonton, that every person residing in the Town of Hammonton who shall own, keep, or harbor any dogs, bitch or bitches, shall have the same registered and numbered with the Town Clerk, and shall place upon the neck of each dog or bitch kept or harbored a collar, having engraved thereon upon a metal surface the name of the owner of said dog or bitch, and the register number thereof; and it shall be lawful for such person as may be authorized by Council for that purpose to kill any dog or bitch found straying off the owner's premises without such collar upon its neck.

Sec. 2. And be it ordained, That it shall be the duty of the Town Clerk to register the name of the owner of every dog or bitch, and the number, in a book provided for that purpose, numbering them in the order of owners applying for said registration; and giving to each person information of the registered number thereof. The person applying for registration shall pay the sum of One Dollar for each dog or bitch registered, of which the Clerk shall receive twelve cents for each registration, the balance to be applied to paying damage done by dogs to domestic animals or poultry, after the same shall have been appraised by two freeholders as authorized and directed by an act entitled "An act for the preservation of sheep," approved April 14, 1846, and the supplement thereto; and in case there is no damage, such balance to become a part of the general fund of the town.

Sec. 3. And be it ordained that the Pound Keeper and Town Marshal are hereby authorized and empowered to kill any dog, male or female, found straying off the owner's premises without such collar as above provided for on its neck.

Sec. 4. And be it ordained, That this ordinance shall take effect immediately.
