## Sunday School Convention.

The Sunday Schools of Atlantic  
County are being called on for their  
annual statistical reports to the Coun-  
ty and State Associations. Last year's  
census showed 70 schools in the coun-  
ty, and a total attending membership  
of 5000, besides 688 home-department  
students and 888 on cradle rolls.

In four counties, Middlesex, Mon-  
mouth, Somerset and Warren, the  
Secretaries succeeded in getting a re-  
port from every school. The informa-  
tion gathered by means of these re-  
ports is of great value in determining  
the lines of work of the Association

### Board of Trade.

The regular meeting was held on  
Tuesday evening. The attendance was  
not as large as in April, eight or ten be-  
ing ladies.

"There was no business of serious im-  
portance to transact. The Committee  
on street sprinkling reported that Coun-  
cil had no money which could be used  
for that purpose.

Free and informal discussion of sev-  
eral things followed, especially railroad  
fares. The range was wide, taking in  
watered stock, public apathy, newspaper  
publishers' want of courage and  
public spirit—and other things too num-  
erous to mention.

At ten o'clock Mr. Adlington was  
called upon to read his paper on "What  
we have done." This was certainly en-  
tertaining, written in a prophetic  
spirit, detailing many of the improve-  
ments made in Hammononton between  
1908 and 1923. These included street  
paving, pneumatic tubes for conveying  
garbage to the crematory on the an-  
tary farm; the Lake cleaned out and  
at least two great technical schools es-  
tablished on its shores; gas lights done  
away with, and electricity used for  
light and heat, including cooking and  
power for domestic purposes. It was an  
attractive picture, not excepting the  
lowering of railroad fares so that one  
could ride hence to New York for eleven  
cents.

Meets. Bargan and A. L. Jackson  
and Mrs. Jackson made pertinent criti-  
cisms and commendatory remarks, and  
the Board thanked Mr. A. for his paper.  
We think that some method of curb-  
ing certain speakers is needed; that no  
one should be allowed to monopolize  
more than one-half of the time of meet-  
ing. Then, too, unless the Board is  
willing to be named a "knicker club,"  
less vigorous language must be indulged  
in, and more charity displayed in criti-  
cism of those who differ with us.

Mr. Steel will read a paper at the  
June meeting—its title being as yet un-  
announced.
