



We call special attention to chap ter 148 of the State Laws, as published in our issue of May 4th. How many of our readers read it? It is well known that heretofore a property owner could not punish a gunner who trespassed upon his land, even in the face of a printed warning, unless he could prove some actual damage. Under this new law, the fact of trespass with a gun is all that needs to be proven, and damages of "not less than ten dollars" is imposed. Further protection is given; and the last section provides that any one proven guilty of tearing down or destroying a trespass notice shall be fined not to exceed twenty dollars or Abs imprisonment not to exceed thirty days, or both.

MR.
