Athletic Association.

After months of planning and working, the Athletic Association is ready to open the base ball season. To day is "Opening day," and the following schedule will be strictly adhered to.

The Parade will form at 2.15 on Railroad Avenue, front at Twelfth St., and extending toward the shoe factories.

Parade, led by the Band, will start at 2.30, and go via Bellevue Ave., Central Ave. and Vine St., to the grounds.

The Egg Harbor team and both the local teams will be in line, also the Association trustees and members and the track teams and others. The Association will not conduct a triangle run.

Promptly at 3 o'clock, the track events will start on the new quarter mile track in the grounds. Entries will be kept open until time of races, but all contestants must report in time for races.

The races will be over about 3.30. A short time will be allowed for the teams to "warm up," and Band will render a number of selections.

At 4 o'clock, Mayor Austin will toss out the first ball, the Umpire will call "play ball," and our base ball season will be on.

Admission to grounds will be 15 cents. Grand stand, 20 cents. Ladies in grand stand, 15 cents. Children under 15 will be admitted for 10 cents. No extra charge will be made on account of the track meet, and the above prices will be the regular charges for all games.

Mr. Clifford C. Small has been appointed manager for the traveling team, and will shortly arrange a schedule for them.

Remember, that this will probably be our only game with Egg Harbor this year.

The grounds have been improved and put in fine condition.

There has been a great awakening of base ball enthusiasm this year, and to day will be the first opportunity to show it.

A large attendance will be a great encouragement to our boys on the teams, and to the Association. Clean sport, properly managed, deserves support. Let us have it.

Town Council Meeting.

It was a special meeting, held on
 Saturday evening, to consider the di-
 vision of Hammoncton into election
 precincts, as required by the new
 law. This same law required that
 this division must be completed
 before May 15th. Messrs. Sharpe
 and Turner were absent.

The ordinance presented at last
 meeting was taken up, thoroughly
 discussed, and finally passed. It
 makes four districts, which we de-
 scribe in short measure.

First, from Third and Bellevue,
 south on Third to Maple, to County
 Road, to Seventh Street (the Town
 line), thence to Third Road, to
 Twelfth Street, to Third. It con-
 tains 219 voters.

Second, —Third and Bellevue,
 north via Wilsey Mill Road to
 Camden County line, to Third
 Road, to Twelfth Street, to Third.
 292 voters.

Third, —from Third and Bellevue,
 south to Maple, to County Road,
 to Seventh Street, to Burlington
 County line, to Middle Road, to
 Main Road, to Bellevue, to Third.
 210 voters.

Fourth, —Third and Bellevue, to
 Main Road, to Middle Road, to Bur-
 lington County line, to Camden
 County line, to Third Street, to
 Bellevue. 242 voters.

The description will be found
 more explicit in the ordinance,
 which we publish in full this week.

The ordinance repealing the four
 inch tire rebate was also passed.

An adjourned meeting will be
 held next Wednesday evening.

Town Ordinances.

An ordinance repealing an ordinance entitled
 "An ordinance to allow a rebate of taxes to
 all persons owning and using wagons with
 tires four inches or wider in width," passed
 Oct. 26, 1900, and, an ordinance entitled
 "Supplement to an ordinance entitled 'An
 ordinance to allow a rebate of taxes to all
 persons owning and using wagons with
 tires four inches or wider in width,' passed
 August, 30th, 1902."

Introduced April, 19th, 1911.
 Passed May 14th, 1911.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town of
 Hammoncton in Council assembled, that an
 ordinance entitled "An ordinance to allow a
 rebate of taxes to all persons owning and us-
 ing wagons with tires four inches or wider in
 width," passed October 26th, 1900, and, an or-
 dinance entitled "Supplement to an ordinance
 entitled 'An ordinance to allow a rebate of
 taxes to all persons owning and using wagons
 with tires four inches or wider in width,'
 passed August, 30th, 1902, be and the same are
 hereby repealed.
 Section 2. And be it further ordained that
 this ordinance shall take effect immediately.
 (Signed) JOHN M. AUSTIN, Mayor.

An ordinance dividing the Town of Hammoncton
 into four election districts and fixing
 the boundary lines thereof.
 Introduced May 10th, 1911.
 Passed May 15th, 1911.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town of
 Hammoncton in Council assembled, that the
 First Election District shall comprise all the
 territory bounded by, and lying within the
 following lines:

Beginning at the intersection of Bellevue
 Avenue and Third Street, and thence south-
 erly along the west side of the center line of
 Third Street to Maple Street; thence westerly
 along the northern side of the center line of
 Maple Street to the Egg Harbor Road; thence
 southerly along the west side of the center of
 the Egg Harbor Road to Bellevue Avenue;
 thence southerly along the Town line westerly
 to Third Road; thence along the line of
 Third Road northerly to Twelfth Street;
 thence along the south side of the center line
 of Twelfth Street easterly to Bellevue Ave.;
 thence along the south side of the center line
 of Bellevue Avenue easterly to Third Street.
 The Second Election District shall comprise
 all the territory bounded by, and lying with-
 in, the following lines:

Beginning at the intersection of Bellevue
 Avenue and Third Street, and thence north-
 erly along the west side of the center line of
 Third Street and the Wilsey Mill Road to
 Camden County line; thence easterly along
 the Camden County line to Third Road;
 thence southerly along the line of Third Road
 to Twelfth Street; thence southerly along the
 north side of the center line of Twelfth Street
 to Bellevue Avenue; thence easterly along
 the north side of the center line of Bellevue
 Avenue to Third Street.

The Third Election District shall comprise
 all the territory bounded by, and lying with-
 in, the following lines:

Beginning at the intersection of Bellevue
 Avenue and Third Street, and thence north-
 erly along the east side of the center line of
 Third Street to Maple Street; thence westerly
 along the southerly side of the center line of
 Maple Street to the Egg Harbor Road; thence
 southerly along the east side of the Egg Har-
 bor Road to Seventh Street; thence westerly
 along the Town line to the line of Burling-
 ington County; thence northerly along the
 line of Burlington County to the center of the
 Atison Road; thence southerly along the
 center of the Atison Road to Middle Road;
 thence westerly along the southerly side of the
 center of Middle Road to Main Road; thence
 northerly along the westerly side of the
 center Main Road to Bellevue Avenue;
 thence westerly along the southerly side of
 the center line of Bellevue Avenue to Third
 Street.

Section 2. Be it ordained, that all ordi-
 nances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with
 this ordinance, and the same are hereby
 repealed, and this ordinance shall take effect
 immediately.

 request consumers to use every care to
 prevent unnecessary flow of water, or
 loss through leakage. Extra precaution
 is called for at this season of the year.
 Particular attention is directed to Sec.
 9 of the Rules, which reads:

"Sec. 9. If any one shall permit water
 to flow unnecessarily from any private
 pipe or fixture thereof on his or her
 premises, or by him or her occupied,
 either within or without a building or
 enclosure, every such person shall, upon
 conviction, forfeit and pay for each such
 conviction, the sum of Five (5) Dollars,
 to be collected as set forth in Section 8;
 and in addition it shall be lawful for the
 Commissioners to cut off the supply of
 water from such premises, and it shall
 not again be turned on until the fines
 are paid."

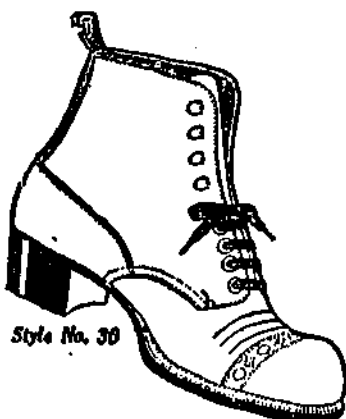
It is further to be observed that lawn
