MAY-DAY A SUCCESS.

Words are inadequate to describe last Saturday's May-Day Festival. To say that it even eclipsed the expectations of the committees themselves, is putting it mildly.

The day dawned cool and cloudy, but fortunately few drops fell. Crowds began assembling before nine o'clock, and ere the march of the school children started, (425 of them, down Bellevue to the Pennsy and return) there were several thousand people, mostly standing, or seated comfortably in the scores of automobiles. The Boy Scouts and Girl Pioneers were not numerously represented in the parade, both organization being assigned to active duties in the exercises.

First was the forming of a human flag by two hundred and sixty girls of at least a half-dozen nationalities, and singing "Star Spangled Banner," — a splendid tableau, enacted by future American citizens.

Miss Miriam Elvins, as May Queen, was escorted to her throne by Misses Helen Cunningham and Elizabeth Eckhardt, and followed by Miss Helen Weiscoat, crown bearer. Then, amid cheers and blasts of horns, little Miss Dorothy Davenport placed the crown upon the head of the fair young Queen.

This and the following numbers resembled a scene from fairyland. Fourteen little girls, from first to fifth grades, in a garland dance, delighted all. Main Road pupils, mostly Itahans, surprised all by their gymnastic exercises. Indian Sun Dance, by Camp Fire Girls, dressed as Indian maidens, went through strange manœuvres, and interested all. Twenty cute little Kindergartners danced, marched in a circle, and sang, to the delight of every lover of kiddies.

The May Pole winding was an exercise never seen here before, and which no one would have missed for the world; and we doubt whether it could have been done better anywhere. Cheer after cheer was given by the great circle of enthusiastic onlookers.

One of the prettiest sights was a "Flower Drill" by twelve pretty misses.

This, with other exercises, were taken in by a Pathé film camera, and the pictures will be shown here at Little's in a couple of weeks, and later in thousands of cities and towns throughout the country, thus advertising Hammonton as a truly American town, a good place to live in.

Throughout the day, the new Columbus Band, looking well in their new uniforms, rendered excellent music.

At the song competition, held in the Assembly Room, all supposed that Egg Harbor would carry off the honors; but May's Landing stepped in and captured them. Miss Eckhardt, their instructor, received commendation from every side.

The afternoon field-day sporting events were, without doubt, the best ever held in the county. The particulars in regard to winners cannot be given this week, as the committees meet to day to figure out the various schools' number of "units," but readers can watch for next week's issue.

The girls of Pleasantville High School went off with honors as did the Northfield Grammar girls, the latter scoring 15 points, 36 to 14 for Pleasantville.

According to the official scores, there was tie in boys' High School events; but that will be threshed out at to day's conference.


Boys' Grammar School honors are Hammonton's — their score being 27, Pleasantville 25; Egg Harbor 23.
