## THE COMET.

Halley's Comet has been making its advent to the solar system since 44 B.C., every 75 or 76 years, to the present. In 1683 the people of Europe were greatly alarmed by its appearance, and the Pope excommunicated the Turk, the Devil, and the Comet, and had processions and prayers said by all the people at noon each day, to avert the great calamity that menaced the earth. The comet seems to have paid no attention to the anathemas pronounced against it, but keeps right on appearing at its appointed time.

Scientists declare it to be in the solar system and its tail in the path of Earth, and the earth passed through it on last night. They told us that there would be many shooting stars, meteors, and aurora, electric disturbance, etc. Millions watched all night to see these things, but the report this morning is that nothing unusual or remarkable appeared. The prophecy of scientists appears to have been an absolute failure. What is the matter with the scientists? They thought they saw the comet between Earth and Sun, when they only saw its reflected image, that had no substance to produce the phenomena they expected.

The comet belongs to a sister Sun, whose cometary bodies come in contact with Sun's sphere of attractive and repulsive force, and course along that sphere of force, shorter or longer according to the position of Sun's outer planets in their orbits, whether on the side near the contact of the comet, with the sphere of attractive and repulsive force of Sun's system or not. No outside comet ever comes within that sphere of force. That sphere is the outer sphere of Sun's outer planet. The comet coming in contact with that sphere in its regular orbit around its mother sun, reflects its image upon the outer stratum of unevolved matter in which Venus' orbit is situated, and is thence reflected to Earth. This image is usually greatly distorted, and the comet's true form is rarely seen. The mirror changing form causes most rapid and unaccountable changes in comet's appearance.

The comet is simply a young world, not yet condensed to a solid surface. All worlds have been comets. It takes many millions of years for a world to condense to the condition of a solid crust. Every comet has its place provided for, and it cannot get out of its path, though that path is very eccentric and great liberty is allowed it to ramble, but never to enter the sphere of repulsive force of another planet.

**AN ORDINANCE** regulating the erection of privies, toilets, and urinals within certain limits of the Town of Hammoncton, Atlantic County, New Jersey.

Introduced March 13, 1910. Passed May 17, 1910.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Health of the Town of Hammoncton, County of Atlantic and State of New Jersey:

1. No person or persons, corporation or corporations shall hereafter erect or cause to be erected on properties facing on streets upon which water mains are laid, any privy, privies, toilet or toilets, urinal or urinals, unless properly connected to sewer or cess-pool by flush closet, within that part of the Town of Hammoncton in the district bounded as follows: to wit—Maple Street to Central Avenue, Central Avenue to Grape Street, Grape Street to Valley Avenue, Valley Avenue to Bellevue Avenue, Bellevue Avenue to Fourth Street, Fourth Street to Pratt Street, Pratt Street to Grand Street, Grand Street to Live Street, Live Street to Egg Harbor Road, Egg Harbor Road to Maple Street.

2. That any privies, toilets and urinals hereafter erected or constructed in any way contrary to the provisions of this ordinance shall be and the same are hereby declared a nuisance.

3. Each person or corporation who shall hereafter erect or cause to be erected any privy or privies, toilet or toilets, urinal or urinals, not connected to sewer or cess pool by flush closet, shall be liable to a penalty of Ten Dollars for each offence.

4. That this ordinance shall take effect immediately.

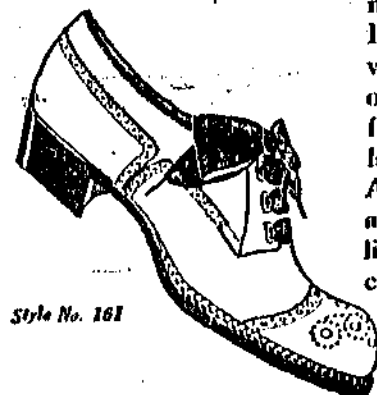
