Special School Meeting.

It was an interesting if not a very
prolonged meeting that was held on
Monday afternoon, in the General
Assembly Room. In fact, it required
but nine minutes to organize, offer a
resolution, take a ballot, declare the re-
sult, and adjourn.

And why? Because, though the meet-
ing had been well advertised, and \$3500
of taxes were to be considered, only
eight voters of the thousand and more
in town felt interest enough to be pres-
ent. Three of these were members of
the Board, two were janitors, one the
Principal, one lady and one other citi-
zen.

Orville E. Hoyt was elected chairman
and W. R. Seely secretary.

Mr. Osgood offered the following: RE-
SOLVED, That there be raised by special
district tax, for enlarging First Road
school house, and for repairing and fur-
nishing school houses, the sum of \$2300;
and for payment of district note, the
sum of \$1200.

This was adopted without a dissent-
ing vote.

This total is just \$5040 less than the
District appropriated last year—a nice
little saving.

Business being completed, the meet-
ing adjourned.

Town Council Meeting.

A special meeting was held last Satur-
day afternoon, May 16th, at three
o'clock.

The resignations of Messrs. H. J.
Monfort, E. W. Strickland, and George
Berry, assessors, presented at last meet-
ing, were accepted.

On motion the salary of the chairman
of the Board of Assessors was increased
to \$200 per year; that of the other mem-
bers to \$75.

Messrs. Strickland, Monfort and Ber-
ry were then elected Assessors, to serve
until Nov. next, when a full board will
be elected—one for one year, one for
two years, and one for three years.

After considerable discussion, Council
voted to pay the Fourth of July Com-
mittee \$60 for the grand stand erected
by them in the Park.

The question of opening an extension
of Packard Street west of Fairview was
taken up. It appears that but one man
resides on the proposed new street, and
Council does not feel justified in spend-
ing so much money when no other resi-
dent will be materially benefitted.

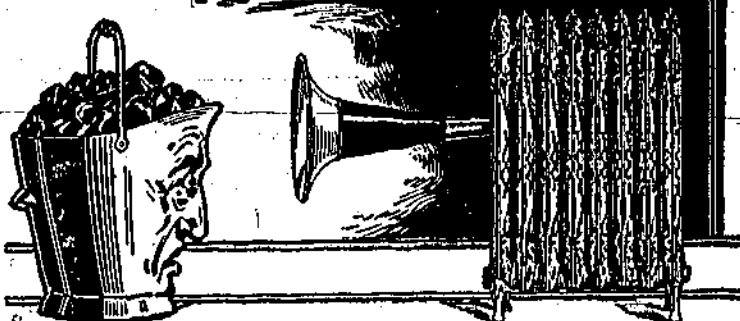
