Dr. A. Forel, one of the most distinguished professors of the University of Zurich, Switzerland, a specialist as to nervous diseases, says:

"Alcohol, even when diluted, as in wine, beer, and cider, is a poison which changes pathologically the tissues of the body, and leads to fatty degeneration.

"A glass of wine, or half-liter of beer is also injurious, because it injures the brain by producing paralysis and disarrangement of the function."

This has been uncontrovertibly demonstrated by the leading professors. Moderate drinking of alcohol is useless for the individual--yes, quite useless,--and as an example and fashion causes great injury to the masses, producing much misery.

The moderate drinkers do not remain so: the majority finally become drunkards. The strictly moderate are few, almost the exception.

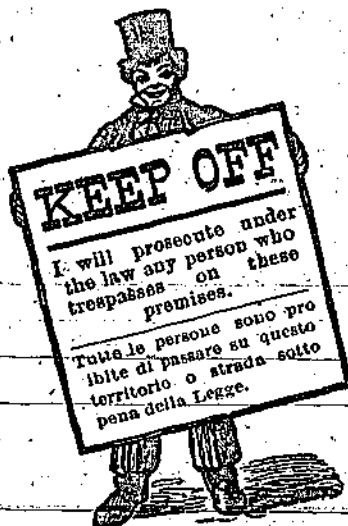
