Railroad Rates Considered.

It will be recalled that the State Civic
Federation took early action in opposi-
tion to the announced imposition of
added burdens on commuters traveling
between Philadelphia and Shore points.

The result of that action is the advice
of Messrs. Colby and Whiting (the firm
comprises State Senator Everett Colby
and State Railroad Commissioner Bor-

den D. Whiting) that under the terms
of the Interstate Commerce Law, as
amended by the Hepburn Act, the In-

terstate Commerce Commission has ju-
isdiction to inquire into the justice, fair-
ness and reasonableness of rates for
such transportation (from Philadelphia

by ferry and rail to seashore points in
South Jersey), and upon a proper case
made, to afford relief and prescribe the
maximum rates to be charged.

It is further advised that such an
Association as the State Civic Federa-
tion "is empowered to complain" to the
Commission; and also that "under au-

thoritative decisions" the facts involved in
the transportation of passengers from
Philadelphia to points in South Jersey
"shall be subject to the carrier concerned
to the jurisdiction of the Federal Com-

missioner."

It being established that the Com-
mission has power to act on complaint
and that the State Civic Federation is
empowered to complain, all that is ne-
cessary to carry the case to its hearing

is the co-operation of commuters and
all other interested persons, such as
real estate agents and property owners,
in every community affected by the

heavy burden arbitrarily imposed on
them. Such persons are urged to send
their names at once to John A. Burgess,

South Jersey member of the Executive
Board of the State Civic Federation,
who has accepted the duty of organiz-

ing the interested persons, and will give
all information as to the plan con-
templated to rectify the injustice done at

the instance of corporate greed and
to utter disregard of the interests of
commuters and the growing towns in
which they live. No time should be
lost in getting organized, so that action
may be taken at the earliest moment.

Burning Brush.

The State Forest Commission calls

attention to the fact that permits to

burn brush, waste, etc., are required

only in townships or other municipali-

ties in which fire wardens have been ap-

pointed. Further, that even in such

townships permits are not now neces-

sary when the fire is in a public road, a

garden, or a plowed field, and is more

than 200 feet from any woodland, brush-

land, or field containing dry grass or

other inflammable material. In all

other cases permits must be obtained

from the fire warden at all times of the

year (not only from March 10 to May

31, as formerly).

The minimum penalty for burning

brush without a permit has been re-

duced from \$50 to \$20. For all other

violations of the Fire Law the penalty is

still not less than \$50. In all municipali-

ties without fire wardens no permits

are required under any circumstances.
