## Flag Day.

On June 14th, 1777, the Congress resolved "that  
the flag of the thirteen United States be thirteen  
stripes, alternate red and white; that the Union be  
thirteen stars, white, in a blue field, representing  
a new constellation." This flag, with the increase  
of stars as the states have entered the Union, is  
the flag of the Republic to-day.

By Act of Congress the commemoration of June  
fourteenth as Flag Day is recommended. The flag  
stands for the sovereignty of the United States,  
the unity and glory of the Republic. It is fitting  
that we celebrate the day and renew upon it our  
allegiance to our beautiful emblem of liberty.

Therefore, I, John Franklin Fort, Governor of  
the State of New Jersey, do hereby appoint Mon-  
day, the fifteenth day of June (the fourteenth fall-  
ing on Sunday), as a day to be observed as Flag  
Day through the State; and do recommend that all  
officials in control of buildings, and all occupants  
of dwellings, see to it that the flag be displayed  
upon all such buildings and dwellings; and that  
proper observance of said day be had in all schools,  
public or private, in the State, that the youth of  
the State may increase their admiration for, and  
devotion to, the National Emblem.

And I do further recommend that on Sunday,  
the fourteenth day of June next, the flag be dis-  
played in every Church and Sunday School, and  
that suitable reference be made thereto. Next to  
one's love of things Divine should be the love of  
our country and our country's flag.

Given under my hand and the great seal of the  
State of New Jersey at Trenton, this first day of  
June, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine  
hundred and eight, and of the Independence of  
the United States the one hundred and thirty-second.

### June on the Great Lakes.

Restful, delightful, interesting and instructive, there is no trip
