A Fraud Halted by Uncle Sam.

Some weeks ago, Postmaster M. L. Jackson began receiving letters from West Virginia, Ohio, Kentucky, and elsewhere, inquiring about certain lands in the neighborhood of DaCosta's and East Hammon. The writers stated that they had received from a concern in Pittsburgh, Pa., announcing the distribution of lots in the tract referred to, by a sort of lottery scheme. These cards were of the "return" pattern, each containing a number. Evidently every number was a lucky (?) one, and the holder thereof was notified that by remitting \$2.50 to pay for drawing up the deed, he would receive the conveyance, properly executed, and become a landed proprietor.

Whether any deeds were received, or not, deponent knoweth not, but our postmaster knew that \$2.50 was more than he would pay for a whole acre of that land, hence referred the matter to the Post Office Department. Soon an inspector was sent on, who viewed the promised land, investigated the mode of procedure, and reported. As a result, on Tuesday last, 13th inst., the Department issued an order against the "Elton Realty Company," 434 Fourth Avenue, Pittsburgh, which instructs every postmaster to return all mail from said concern, labeled "Fraud."

Thus Uncle Sam endeavors to protect his children from swindlers who attempt to profit by the credulity of men who are willing to accept something for nothing. The scheme was likely to injure our own beloved burg, as its churches and schools were included among the desirable attractions of the advertised tract, which contains not one of either, nor even a dwelling, so far as we know.

LOCAL TELEPHONE.

The Hammon Telephone and Telegraph Company has been legally organized and incorporated, most of its stock subscribed for, and work on its line may begin at once. The authorized capital is \$125,000; but \$12,500 will be included in the first issue of stock, that being considered sufficient for present needs. \$25 is the par value of each share, and no one has been offered more than eight shares, running down to one each. The first meeting was held in Fireman's Hall on Thursday evening, June 15th, when the Charter was read, by-laws discussed and adopted, and the following Directors elected:

For three years, W. L. Black, M. L. Jackson, L. H. Parkhurst, A. J. Rider, H. McD. Little.

For two years, Geo. Elvins, Edw. H. White, L. F. Horns, B. W. Richards. For one year, Sam'l Anderson, R. J. Byrnes, Wm. J. Smith, Wm. Colwell. These thirteen will elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer, and these officers will constitute an Executive Committee for the conduct of business. The Directors will meet on the second Monday in each month.

The rental price of phones will be about fifteen dollars per year, with unlimited local service; and arrangements have already been made for long-distance connection, for which a small fee will necessarily be charged. The list of directors includes only men whom we all know as successful citizens, and it looks as though the scheme will be made to go. We hope so.

An adjourned meeting will be held next Tuesday evening, for business.
