**CHAPTER DXXXVII.**—A further supplement to the act entitled "An act to prevent gaming." Approved April 1, 1869.

1. Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That nothing in the act entitled "A supplement to an act to prevent gaming," approved March twenty-sixth, eighteen hundred and forty-three, shall be construed to forbid the erecting and maintaining of a gynasium under the authority of the trustees of any college, with such appliances for physical exercise and development as said trustees may in their discretion see fit to introduce therein.

2. And be it enacted, That this act shall take effect immediately.

Approved March 31, 1869.

**CHAPTER OCXXIX.**—A further supplement to the act entitled "An act to establish and regulate pilots for the ports of Jersey City, Newark, and Perth Amboy, by means of Sandy Hook." Approved April seventeenth, eighteen hundred and forty-six.

1. Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That the second section of the act entitled "An act to establish and regulate pilots for the ports of Jersey City, Newark, and Perth Amboy, by means of Sandy Hook," approved April seventeenth, eighteen hundred and forty-six, which supplement was approved March fifteen, eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, be and the same hereby repealed.

2. And be it enacted, That all masters of foreign vessels and vessels from a foreign port, and all vessels sailing under register, bound in or over the bar of Sandy Hook, shall take a licensed pilot, or in case of refusal to take such pilot, shall himself, owner or consignee, pay the said pilotage as if one had been employed, and such pilotage shall be paid to the pilot first engaged or offering his services as pilot to such vessel; provided, that this section shall not apply to any citizen of New Jersey who is engaged in the coasting trade who shall have sole command and charge, and be the enrolled or registered master of any vessel bound in or over such bar.

3. And be it enacted, That all laws now in force, and which are inconsistent with the provisions of this act, be and the same are hereby repealed.

4. And be it enacted, that this act shall take effect immediately.

Approved April 1, 1869.

**CHAPTER XL.**—An act relative to taxes in certain counties of this state.

1. Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That all taxes hereafter to be assessed, on the counties of Hudson, Union, Essex, and in the city of New Brunswick, Middlesex county, and in the county of Passaic, except the townships of West Milford, Pompton and Wayne, for state, county, township and city purposes, and also the amount to be raised by a poll tax, shall be assessed and raised in the same proportion as upon all real estate, shares and personal property taxable by law, except mortgages situated in said counties and city, both of residents and non-residents, by valuing the same at the true, full and fair value thereof, as shall be necessary to make the amount required by such taxes and otherwise; and the taxes shall be designated in their assessments the "numbers" or general descriptions of lots or parcels of land, and the value of chattels and all personal property subject thereto, to each person, corporation, association or party; and all real and personal estate shall be assessed in the townships and wards and cities where found without any deduction for mortgages thereon; and all mortgages upon real estate, chattels or personal property taxable by law within said county and city shall be exempt from taxation when they are in the hands of any inhabitant, corporation or association residing or located in said counties or city; but said mortgages shall not be so exempt while in the hands of any inhabitant, corporation or association residing or located in any county or place in this state not named in this act.

2. And be it enacted, That an act entitled "An act relative to certain counties of this state," approved April eighth, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, and the supplement thereto, approved April seventeenth, eighteen hundred and eighty-eight, be and the same are hereby repealed.

3. And be it enacted, that no act shall be deemed to modify or repeal this act, unless so expressed therein, and this act shall take effect immediately.

**CHAPTER CCCXLXVI.**—An act for the more certain discharge or cancellation of mortgages recorded in this state.

1. Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the state of New Jersey, That any mortgage which has been recorded or registered, or that may hereafter be recorded or registered, shall be discharged upon the record thereof by the officer in whose custody it shall be whenever there shall be presented to him a certificate signed by the mortgagor, his heirs, executors, administrators or assigns, acknowledging or proved and certified in the manner prescribed by the act entitled "An act respecting conveyances," specifying that such mortgage has been paid or otherwise satisfied and discharged.

2. And be it enacted, that every such certificate and the proof or acknowledgement thereof shall be recorded at full length and a reference made to the book and page containing such record in the minute of the discharge of such mortgage, made by the officer upon the record thereof.

3. And be it enacted, that the said clerk or register shall be allowed for services done by virtue of this act a sum of fifty (50) cents and no more.

4. And be it enacted, that this act shall take effect immediately.

**CHAPTER CCCXLXVII.**—An act to enable the United States Companies to improve lands under water at Kill Van Kull and other places.

Whereas, the United Delaware and Raritan Canal Company, the Camden and Amboy Railroad and Transportation Company, and the New Jersey Railroad and Transportation Company, have recently secured to this state the payment of five thousand dollars for the grant of land under water, in front of lands owned by them, and are desirous of having the right and privilege of erecting and making wharves, piers and other improvements in front of other lands now owned by or in trust for them, so that they may easily make such improvements as they may find necessary to facilitate their business; therefore,

1. Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That the act entitled "An act in relation to the inspection of steam boilers, and for the better protection of life and property against accidents by steam boiler explosions," approved April sixteenth, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, be and the same are hereby repealed.

2. And be it enacted, That this act shall take effect immediately.

Approved March 31, 1869.

**CHAPTER CCCXLXVIII.**—An act to complete the geological survey of this state, approved March thirtieth, eighteen hundred and sixty-four.

1. Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That for the purpose of completing said survey the annual appropriation of five thousand dollars be and hereby continued for a further period of four years, subject to be suspended at the discretion of the governor; and the treasurer of the state, upon the warrant of the comptroller, shall be and is hereby authorized to pay such bills of expenses as may be audit and approved by the board of managers in favor of the State geologist.

2. And be it enacted, that this act shall take effect immediately.

**CHAPTER CCCXLXIX.**—A supplement to the act entitled "An act to complete the geological survey of this state," approved March thirtieth, eighteen hundred and sixty-four.

1. Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That the provisions of the second section of the act to which this is a supplement shall apply not only to conveyance made and executed by sheriffs and other officers, as therein provided, but shall apply also to all deeds, declarations of sale and conveyances, duly acknowledged or proved, before or hereafter made by, or by authority of any public or municipal authority, authority or virtue of any law of the state to make and execute or to direct or procure the making and execution of any deed, declaration of sale and conveyance; and the proceedings upon which such deeds, declarations of sale and conveyances are founded, shall not be subject to be questioned collaterally, but may be any time reviewed by circuit or other proceeding in the supreme or appellate court.

2. And be it enacted, that this act shall take effect immediately.

**CHAPTER CCCXLXVII.**—An act to appoint Harbor Masters and Inspectors.

1. Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That the governor by and with the advice and consent of the senate, shall appoint two harbor masters, who shall hold their offices respectively for three years, and in case any harbor master so appointed shall die or resign, or in any other way be disqualified to act, it shall be the duty of the governor forthwith to fill such vacancy, and the person so appointed shall hold such office until the next session of the legislature, and such harbor master shall have authority to regulate and station all ships and vessels in the bay of New York or in the New River, within the limits of Jersey City and Hoboken and the wharves thereof, and to remove, from time to time, such ships and vessels as are not employed in recruiting and discharging their cargoes, to market, for such other as require to be more immediately accommodated, for the purpose of recruiting and discharging cargoes; as to the fact of their being fairly and bona fide employed in recruiting and discharging their cargoes, the said harbor masters, or either of them, shall have authority to determine how far, and in what instances, it is the

duty of masters and others, having charge of ships and vessels, to accommodate each other in their respective situations, and if any master or other persons, having charge of any ship or vessel, shall refuse or neglect to obey the directions of the said harbor masters, or either of them, in matters of the duties of their office, or if any master shall resist or oppose the said harbor masters, or either of them, in the execution of the duties of their office, the said master or other person, having charge of any ship or vessel, or other person whatever, shall, for every such offence, forfeit and pay the sum of fifty dollars, be it enacted.

2. And be it enacted, That the boundaries of Atlantic City, approved March thirtieth, eighteen hundred and sixty-four, shall be construed to forbid the erecting and maintaining of a gynasium under the authority of the trustees of any college, with such appliances for physical exercise and development as said trustees may in their discretion see fit to introduce therein.

3. Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That nothing in the act entitled "A supplement to an act to prevent gaming," approved March fifteenth, eighteen hundred and forty-three, shall be construed to forbid the erecting and maintaining of a gynasium under the authority of the trustees of any college, with such appliances for physical exercise and development as said trustees may in their discretion see fit to introduce therein.

4. Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That the boundaries of Atlantic City, in the county of Atlantic, shall hereafter be as follows: beginning at a point in the Atlantic Ocean, bearing due south from the junction of the Dry Inlet, thence easterly along the boundary line of the state, thence at right angles with the east side of Absecon Inlet, to which water, thence westerly along the

east side of said inlet to a point opposite and at right angles with the west bank of Clam Thoroughfare; thence southerly along the west bank of said thoroughfare, to its intersection with Beach Thoroughfare; thence southerly along the east bank of said Beach Thoroughfare to the intersection of the aforesaid line on the east side of Dry Inlet; and thence along said line to the place of beginning; and that all laws, ordinances, and provisions heretofore enacted, and made and done, for and affecting said corporation, shall extend to and apply to and embrace the territory hereby annexed, and the inhabitants residing thereon, from and after the passage of this act.

5. Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That the second section of the act entitled "An act to establish and regulate pilots for the ports of Jersey City, Newark, and Perth Amboy, by means of Sandy Hook," approved April sixteenth, eighteen hundred and forty-six, which supplement was approved March fifteen, eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, be and the same are hereby repealed.

6. And be it enacted, That after the passage of this act, Atlantic city shall be and is hereby empowered and required to provide for the proper support and maintenance of the poor of said city, who have a legal settlement therein, and that the said city shall not hereafter be assessed with or liable to pay to Atlantic County any part of the tax to be raised for the support of the poor, or any part of the tax to be assessed and raised for any provision whatsoever made or to be made for the poor of said city.

7. And be it enacted, That this act shall have a full upon the assets thereof for the amount of wages due to them respectively, which shall be paid prior to any other debt or debt of said company, is hereby made applicable to such corporations as are chartered and existing by or under the laws of any other state or government hereafter declared insolvent under and by virtue of the first section of this act, and the word "laborers" shall be considered to include all persons doing labor or service, whatever nature, for or as officers in the regular employ of said corporations, and said item shall extend to amounts payable for the use of patent or patent rights belonging to such laborers and officers, used by said corporation.

8. And be it enacted, That this act shall affect immediately.
