After the addresses, there will be
an open discussion, when any one
present may ask questions, so that
every phase of the subject may be
fully understood.

pay the small addition to our
annual taxes which will be neces-
sary to maintain it.

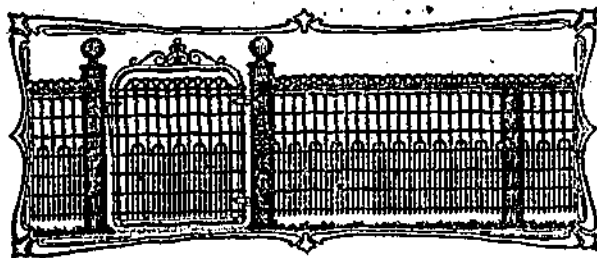
