A Trip to Valley Forge.

A dozen members of the D. A. R. of Hammoncton, concluded to visit that historic ground, Valley Forge, where so many Continental soldiers, during 1777-8, suffered, bled and died for their Country. If the ease and beauties of the trip from Hammoncton were generally known, there would be many such excursions taken. Thinking it will be of interest to the general public to learn how to get there, and what there is to see, I give a condensed statement for the Republican, of our trip there.

We took the Reading R. R. to Philadelphia, there the elevated to 60th street, there connected with a third rail trolley line (the Philadelphia & Western), where we bought tickets to Valley Forge and return. We passed through a most lovely country, with diversified scenery of hill and dale, forest and cultivated grounds, rich with vegetation, thickly sprinkled with fine residences, beautiful grounds, and flourishing villages, among them West Overbrook, Penfield, Beechwood Park, Ardmore Junction, Haverford, Bryn Mawr, Rosemont, Villa Nova, Radner, St. David's and Wayne. Here we got out and took an automobile that seated the whole company and six others. The weather was pleasant and the roads fine, and this part of the route was the most enjoyable of all. The country was rolling and highly cultivated and diversified, and the most romantic of any section within reasonable distance of a day's excursion from Hammoncton. We visited Fort Washington, Ridout and Intrenchments, that are plain to be seen. The Observatory on the highest point of the 472 acres of the Park, owned by the State of Pennsylvania, is 75 feet high, and the ground at its base is 450 feet above the creek at the base of the hill, which is some twenty feet above tide water.

Port Washington, the Redoubt, and the Intrenchments, are on this hill, some five minutes walk below. A very fine view of the surrounding country is afforded from the top of the Observatory.

On another hill, much lower, some half-mile distant from the fort, stands a fine bronze equestrian statue of Gen. Anthony Wayne, who was called "Mad Anthony" because of his reckless courage in battle. This is on a fine granite pedestal, with suitable inscriptions. Not far away are a log hospital, an officers' log house, a bake oven, a soldier's grave, two shafts erected for regiments that encamped there, and granite markers for different societies, of which one was erected by the D. A. R., is of gray granite, 3 x 6 feet, eight feet high, with a bronze tablet, inscribed, "In memory of unknown soldiers buried at Valley Forge—1777-8."

The most interesting of all relics of those times is the stone house and contents, which was General Washington's headquarters during those years. The local Chapter has fitted up the rooms with beds and furniture as nearly like that used by Washington as possible, and added the little wheel and distaff, and big wheel and spindle, to show how the women made yarn from wool and thread from flax. Portraits of Revolutionary officers cover the walls of the main room, and many interesting relics are to be seen.

The remains of the old forge was still to be seen just above, where now stands a modern yarn mill, on the stream. This description would be incomplete without mentioning that the geologist of the party discovered that the stone of the hills were plutonic, and mostly set on edge, denoting convulsive action of the earth in old time, with a large sprinkling of quartz that might carry gold.

Two incidents occurred to the party, worthy of note. While a part of the company was marching toward Headquarters, the martial spirit took possession of the gentleman of the party, and he attempted to march the ladies in true military style. It was thought that the spirit of Washington had taken possession of him, but he denied it, claiming 'twas the spirit of Andrew Jackson. When they arrived, they found the members who had been left behind to rest had been attracted by the spirit of desertion, and gone home. Autos of the line are supposed to leave every hour for the railroad.

We ate our luncheon on the piazza of the hotel, where were tables and chairs at our service, and where those who desired were supplied with coffee.

We started from home on the 7:27 a. m. express, and returned at 5:40 p. m., very tired, but having had a profitable and one of the most enjoyable days of our lives. The fare from 60th St., Philadelphia, is \$1.25, round trip. G.

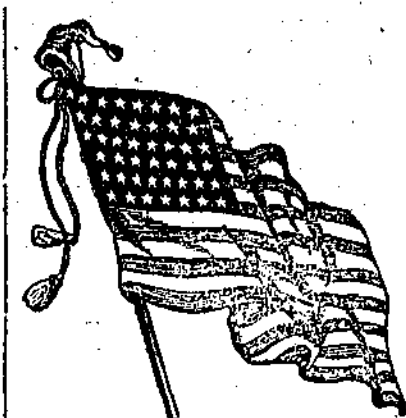

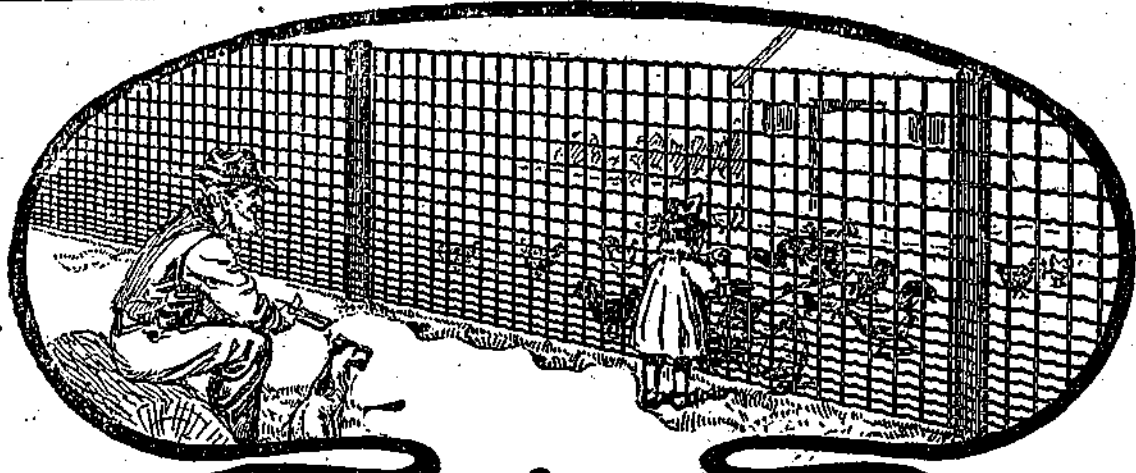

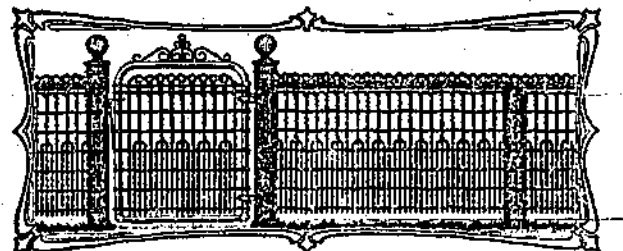
