## They Ride on the Sidewalk.

MR. EDITOR: Last Sunday morning I took my baby out for a short ride on my wheel, and on my way home, when opposite Mrs. Brett's property, I was overtaken by four young men who were riding on the sidewalk. I said to them, "Gentlemen, you are liable to arrest and fine if the Town Marshal sees you riding on the sidewalk." One of the young gentlemen (?) said: "We don't care a d— for the Town Marshal." They rode on, and as far as I could see (nearly to Grape Street), continued on the sidewalk.

As I stood there, I thought it was very kind of our Town Marshal to let these "don't care" fellows ride on the sidewalk, under the shade of the beautiful trees on Central Avenue.

Between the hours of 9:30 and 10:30, that same morning, I sat at my front window and counted thirty-one wheel riders pass my house, and all riding on the sidewalk. Now, Mr. Editor, I ask is this justice to the men who pay taxes in this town? Should we be compelled to ride out in the road, in the hot sun, and the "don't care" fellows be allowed to ride on the sidewalk, in the shade? What is our Marshal doing? 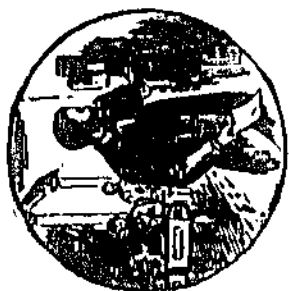

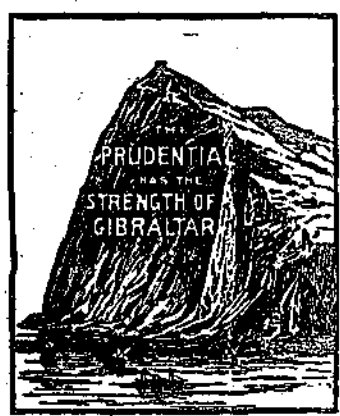

**WAR!**

Since our last issue, Gen. Shafter's army, composed of about 10,000 men, infantry, cavalry, and artillery, were joined by several thousand Cuban, making a grand total of over 30,000. An advance toward Santiago was at once begun. The troops soon encountered a superior Spanish force, advantageously posted in rifle pits and block-houses. In the face of a hot fire, our advance charged into the brush, shooting as they had opportunity, soon dislodged the enemy, and drove them in toward the city, killing and wounding many, and occupying the positions thus won. Each day, since, we have made advances, and held all we gained, on Tuesday planting our flag within three and half miles of Santiago. It is well known that Spain has here a very large army, that the commander has made good use of his time, until this is probably the most strongly fortified city in Cuba, excepting Havana.

Telegrams from Gen. Shafter, on Wednesday, were to the effect that his heavy artillery was being placed, and when all was in readiness he expected to "take Santiago in forty-eight hours; but probably with heavy loss," as the Spaniards were well prepared, and desperate. In the recent fight we lost twenty-two men killed and about sixty wounded. The health of our entire army continues good.

Tuesday, Cubans pointed out the great water main, which supply Santiago with water, and that night some of our engineers cut the pipes—a blow which must be severely felt in the city.

Capt. Sigbee took about 1500 soldiers to Cuba this week, on his cruiser, the "Yale." When passing San Juan, a Spanish cruiser and the torpedo boat destroyer "Terror" attacked him. The "Terror" made a dash for the "Yale," Captain Sigbee coolly waited for the Spaniard, and when near enough gave him so warm a greeting that he had to be towed back to harbor in a sinking condition, with several dead men on board. There were other vessels in sight, but they showed more discretion, and kept their distance. Capt. Sigbee "remembered the Maine," and placed every shot where it would do the most good.

Admiral Dewey reports everything in good shape at Manila, and does not seem worried by the presence of several German and other war vessels in port. In extending a friendly welcome to Prince Henry, of Germany, the Admiral advised him not to allow his vessels to "get between my guns and the enemy." Very suggestive.

The new war revenue act became effective yesterday, July 1st. Stamps must be affixed to bank checks, leases, telegrams, mortgages, etc. We give a partial schedule:

Bonds, debentures, and stock certificates, 5 cent stamp.  
Bank checks, drafts, or certificate of deposit, 2 cent stamp.  
Promissory notes, or U. S. money orders, under \$10, 2 cents. Each additional \$10, 2 cent stamp.  
Telegrams, 1 cent.  
Life insurance policies, exclusive of those issued by fraternal organizations, 8 cents.  
Ins. policies, marine, inland, fire, casualty, liability, non guarantee, 1/2 of 1 cent.  
Leases, 1 year or 25 cents, over to three years 25 cents, over three years \$1.  
Mortgages, 25 cents.  
Passage tickets, U. S. to foreign ports, under \$20, 1/2 cent; over \$20, 1 cent.  
Power of attorney or proxy for voting at election of officers of incorporated companies or associations, having religious, charitable, or literary or public character, 10 cents.  
Shipping bills or receipts, 1/2 cent; 1/2 cent for less, 1/2 cent; each additional \$1, 1/2 cent.  
Receipts for birth in prison or hospital, 10 cent stamp.  
Legacies and distributive shares of personal property, 25 cts. to \$10 on each legacy, according to amount.
