## Jottings from Town Hall.

The ordinance has gotten to "first reading," and will be called up at a special meeting. What the next move will be depends upon circumstances.

At town meeting in March, the people ordered Council to procure two blue print copies of the old town map for five dollars, the motion being offered by an assessor as a substitute for a motion by J. C. Anderson to expend \$500 for "one fourth" of a whole map of the town,—this first map to take in the huckleberry wilds of Atsion. The assessors requested that the blue prints be procured, but were refused by Council because the party who was to make the blue prints wanted his money in advance, which he had a right to ask. This little "fiasco" may cost the town something more in the end.

Although refusing to draw an order as above, Council deliberately voted \$15 to Stephens & Son in violation of law, his services (if any) not being specified. His fee was for "oral advice" to Mr. Cunningham, Mr. Anderson, Mr. Logan, and "a man who represented himself as a member of Council," but whose name he did not then know. As none of the parties were authorized to ask for oral advice (Mr. Cunningham being directed, I understand, to write him), it is plain that Council had no right to pay such a bill. The unknown party may have been a tramp; but it is a sad spectacle when the town must pay the "oral advice" bills of parties who may have their own axes to grind, instead of those for the town. Afterward, Council pondered long and meditatively over the bill of a local physician, which was sent in in much better shape than the lawyer's, and carefully itemized.

Although Mr. Stephens has not been present at any of the Council meetings, he seems to have representatives on the floor, as he wrote a letter to Council in which he objected to statements made by me in the hall, and written for the REPUBLICAN, appending personal remarks to the effect that if continued he might resort to "restraint by moral influence or otherwise." I can appreciate the "moral influence," as lawyers use so much of it, but as the "otherwise" may be on the Fitzsimmons order, it may not be relished. He also said that his advice was cheap, or reasonably charged. I think so, too, as it is not often that a good lawyer values his advice at only \$3.75. Even in Hammonton, a lawyer will not equate at you for less than \$5. But it is possible that his fee was \$14.97 for Mr. Cunningham and one cent each for the others, including the tramp, though I will not say such is the fact. At all events, he did not specify the charge in each case, hence it is cheap, very.

I will take this occasion to state that in Council I represent the people, and propose to do my duty to the best of my ability. It is a portion of my duty to help vote away the people's money, and I do not propose to be intimidated if I object to paying bills which are not specified, or which I think are unauthorized by the town. Neither do I want any of his opinions, as they are not infallible. Even courts reverse their own decisions, sometimes; and I want no assistance unless it is absolutely necessary. Further, I will say that Mr. S. does not make our laws, and the claim that he is a "lawyer" does not give him any higher standing with me than if he was a blacksmith. He may be able to hump two in those who believe that lawyers know it all, but I am not one of the kind that may be classed as man worshippers. There are lawyers and lawyers, and if some estimate their services at \$3.75 it is not the case with all.

I may have to refer to Mr. Stephens again. His threats have as much effect upon me as water falling on a duck's back. As long as he attempts to do service for the town he must expect to do it right, and not charge us for service done some one who represents himself as a town councilman; hence I will express my opinion of his bill, whether he resorts to "moral influence" or "otherwise."

## ONE STRAIGHT.

HAMMONTON WINS THE GAME FROM EGG HARBOR.

They say "all things come to him who waits." We waited, and it came. By dint of considerable pushing on the side of the locals, and a few errors thrown in at the right time by the visitors, our young hopefuls were permitted to trot right merrily around the lately much abused diamond, to the tune of the rooters' medley, until twelve runs stood to their credit, against three for the other fellows.

We started out in the first inning in a way that showed we meant business. Geppert sent through third baseman, reached 2nd on an error, and 3rd on a passed ball. Gallen drew a base on balls. Rudolph sent through short, bringing in Geppert, and Gallen was thrown out at home. Tomlin sent through 2nd, and brought in Rudolph. Loveland drew four balls, and Tomlin scored on Setley's drive to right. The Captain sailed in on Conley's air-ship to left, while Setley died on 2nd. Green and Breder each drew bases on balls, Ruck fanned out, Englehart was thrown out at 1st, Green and Breder came in on H. Breder's hit to right field and error after Setley's drive to centre.

In the third, Loveland spread all his canvas for the port at 2nd, but sailed past and was caught at 3rd.

For several innings both teams were retired with goose-eggs. Mathis was not a little to blame for shutting out the Egg Hunters: he squeezed H. Breder in the sixth, buried Prach's meteorite in seventh, pulled in Ruck's drive in the same with two out and three on bases, and pulled up Hurr in 9th.

In the sixth we got in our work. Setley was given 1st, stole 2nd, moved up on Conley's hit to centre, and the two came in on Toll's two-base drive to centre. Mathis fanned out. Geppert brought in Toll with a sky-scraper to right field for two bases, and counted himself on Gallen's sizzler through H. Breder. An error for Layba counted Gallen. Rudolph was hit by batted ball. Tomlin sent to 2nd and tallied on Loveland's push through 2nd.

In the eighth, four hits, two stolen bases, and an error, brought us in two more runs. Setley soaked a sockdologer to centre for three bags, and scored on Setley's overthrow to 3rd.

**AN ORDINANCE** to prevent and remove all encroachments and nuisances in and upon any street or any part thereof, in the Town of Hammonton.

Introduced April 24, 1897.  
Passed May 29, 1897.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town of Hammonton, That it shall be unlawful to have keep, fasten, or affix by any means whatever, any sign, bill, or advertisement to or upon any shade or other tree standing on any of the sidewalks or public streets in the Town of Hammonton; and that any person who shall violate this ordinance shall be subject to a penalty of ten dollars or imprisonment for ten days, to be sued for and recovered in manner and form as provided by Section 23 of the Town Charter.

Sec. 2. And be it ordained, That this ordinance shall take effect immediately.



**AN ORDINANCE** to prevent and  
prohibit the running at large of  
dogs in the Town of Hammonton.  
Introduced April 24, 1897.  
Passed May 29, 1897.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town of  
Hammonton, that every person residing in the  
Town of Hammonton who shall own, keep, or  
harbor any dogs, bitch or bitches, shall have  
the same registered and numbered with the  
Town Clerk, and shall place upon the neck of  
each dog or bitch kept or harbored a collar,  
having engraved thereon upon a metal tag the  
name of the owner of said dog or bitch, and  
the number of the dog or bitch, and it shall be  
lawful for such person as may be authorized  
by Council for that purpose to kill any dog or  
bitch found straying off the owner's premises  
without such collar upon its neck.

Sec. 2. And be it ordained, That it shall be  
the duty of the Town Clerk to register the  
name of the owner of every dog or bitch, and  
the number, in a book provided for that pur-  
pose, numbering them in the order of owners  
applying for said registration, and giving to  
each person information of the registered  
number thereof. The person applying for reg-  
istration shall pay the sum of One Dollar for  
each dog or bitch registered, of which the  
Clerk shall receive twelve cents for each reg-  
istration, the balance to be applied to paying  
damages done by dogs to domestic animals or  
poultry, after the same shall have been ap-  
praised by two freeholders as authorized and  
directed by an act entitled "An act for the  
preservation of sheep," approved April 14,  
1846, and the supplements thereto; and in case  
there is no damage, such balance to become a  
part of the general fund of the town.

Sec. 3. And be it ordained that the Pound  
Keeper and Town Marshal are hereby author-  
ized and empowered to kill any dog, male or  
female, found straying off the owner's premises  
without such collar as above provided for on  
its neck.

Sec. 4. And be it ordained, That this ordi-  
nance shall take effect immediately.

Horace Paterson Mitchell died at  
his home in Hammonton, N. J., early  
Sunday morning, June 27, 1897, after  
an illness of several months. He was  
54 years old, having been born in Phila-  
delphia in 1842, and made that city  
his home until about six years ago,  
when he moved to Hammonton with  
his wife (formerly Miss Estella Drown)  
and two children. He was an honorary  
member of the First City Troop of  
Philadelphia, with which organization  
he served during the first three months  
of the war. A short time after their  
return he helped to organize Battery I,  
third Penna. Heavy Artillery, and re-  
mained with the company, as First  
Lieutenant, until the close of the war.  
He was a member of Gen. Meade Post,  
No. 1, in Philadelphia, but withdrew  
when he left the city. He was a Ma-  
son, also a member of the Bookkeepers'  
Association of Philadelphia, and of  
Conclave No. 153, Improved Order of  
Heptasophs. Funeral services were  
held at his residence Wednesday after-  
noon, conducted by the Rev. Costello  
Weston.

Seymour Davis, a former appren-  
tice with Wm. Bernabous, was married  
this week to Miss Clara Biddle, daughter  
of a leading physician in Topeka, Kas.  
While in Hammonton, Seymour became  
quite skillful as an architect, later grad-  
uated at the Academy of Fine Arts,  
Philadelphia, located in Topeka, be-  
came State Architect. While traveling,  
some years ago, he was taken very ill,  
was unconscious for several days,
