Regular meeting on last Saturday

Highway Committee reported work

paved, graveling done on Central,
Columbia Road, Tenth Street, and

rious streets.

The compulsory vaccination ordi-
nance taken up and passed second
and final reading.

An ordinance in regard to control
and repaving of sidewalks introduced
and passed first reading, then laid
over, as the law requires, until next
meeting.

Overseer of the Poor reported death
of John A. Robinson, and presented
an inventory of his personal effects.
On motion, Overseer was instructed to
advertise and sell said property to the
best advantage, to reimburse the town
for money spent for his support.

On motion, voted to employ two
extra watchmen from midnight July
3rd, for twenty-four hours.

Clerk instructed to procure six blue-
print copies of the town map.

John Moore given permission to
erect a permanent sign, subject to all
legal restrictions.

Highway Committee authorized to
employ W. H. Burgess to inspect the
gravel beds on the Coburn and adjoin-
ing properties.

John Keyser was elected dog-catch-
er. Highway Committee authorized to
lease land for the dog-pound.

A petition was received, signed by
fifteen property owners, asking the
Council to pass an ordinance for the
control of side-walks. Received.

Petition presented, signed by eleven
citizens, asking Council to refuse per-
mission for a celebration July 16th, in
the neighborhood of St. Joseph's R.
C. Church, claiming the same to be a
nuisance. No action.
