A moresurprised aggregation of ball

PASSED BATTLES.

When a batter is instructed to hunt,
with a man on base, he should make
the attempt, even if the ball pitched
be a wild one. Several runs have
been thrown away in the last few
games by such work.

Several of the home boys should
think quicker, and carry the game in
their minds at all times. Rapid think-
ers are essential to a winning team.

Cordery is doing first-rate work in
the out-field. He assist to third in
the morning game on the Fourth,
was very speedy, as was also his field-
ing of a short hit to first in Saturday's
game.

Tucker kept the crowd amused by
his funny remarks. He is a ball play-
er, though, and wouldn't give up till
the last man was out.

O'Donnell displayed some great
handwork in the seventh, that would

green with envy.

The first thing for an out-fielder to
do after getting a ball is to drive it to
the in-field. It should never be held
an instant.

The batting and fielding averages
for June show few changes in the gen-
eral averages, but the players increased
their fielding and batting averages
considerably.

Conley and J. Jefferson lead in the
order named, and both are batting
wonderfully. All are batting first-
class except Heiser, Scull, and Corde-
ry, and they have improved. Setley
moved up one notch, which is the only
change since May.

In fielding we have also improved,
four men having clean scores. The
fielding average for May was .891, and
for June .926.

During May, the Club batting aver-
age was .353, which is excellent for an
amateur team; but in June it is .387.

During June, the first home runs of
the season were made, of which Jas.
Jefferson, Angelow, and Herbert each
got one.

Next week we will publish the gen-
eral averages for the two months.
