FIEDLER'S.

AN ORDINANCE to provide a Supply of Water for the Town of Hammonton.

Introduced April 21, 1899.
Passed June 24, 1899.

Section 1. Be it enacted, That authority be and the same is hereby given to the Hammonton Water Company to lay pipes at a depth not less than three feet beneath the surface of the public streets, avenues, alleys, and lanes of said town, for the purpose of conducting water.

Sec. 2. That said company shall lay at least four and one-half miles of water mains and pipes — the same to be laid under the direction of the Council — before it shall receive the benefits of and be deemed to have complied with the terms of this ordinance.

Sec. 3. That at all times all of the main and lateral pipes shall be of a size and strength sufficient to supply said town and the inhabitants thereof with a continuous supply of water of a quality and quantity sufficient to meet all public and private requirements.

Sec. 4. That through said pipes shall be conducted only pure, fresh water, that may be drawn from driven or artesian wells within the limits of said town or elsewhere.

Sec. 5. That said company shall construct in said town a tank or tanks, or a stand-pipe, sufficiently large and strong to hold, and which shall at all times contain at least 30,000 gallons of water, at an elevation of not less than forty (40) feet above the highest street level in said town, and that said tank or tanks, or stand-pipe, for a thorough distribution of water, shall be properly connected with the pipes and mains aforesaid.

Sec. 6. That the said company shall at all times furnish a full and uninterrupted supply of water for the extinguishment of fires, for the sprinkling of streets, for the use of public buildings (when the said town enters into a contract for the same), and for mechanical and other private uses; and, subject to the contract aforesaid, such water for the sprinkling of the streets and for fire purposes, shall be furnished for the town, and shall be delivered through anti-freezing double nozzle fire hydrants; the aggregate number of such hydrants shall not be less than thirty-five, located on the pipe distribution throughout said town, and that said hydrants shall be placed at the direction of the Council of said town, and that this requirement shall not be construed to compel the said company to locate or set any fire plug or plugs at a greater distance than three hundred feet from any established service or supply pipe operated by the company; and if the Council shall at any time determine that it is necessary to establish any plug or plugs beyond the limits above specified, then and in that event the actual cost of the establishment and setting of any plug or plugs beyond the limits aforesaid shall be tendered to and paid the said company, when the said plug or plugs are so established and set as aforesaid; that said company shall, under the direction of Council, furnish an adequate supply of water for two drinking fountains and troughs for the use of persons and horses, said fountains and troughs to be erected by the town, and shall furnish all water requisite and necessary for the use of Town Hall and under the conditions that the water supplied so as aforesaid shall be supplied free of any cost to the said town or the inhabitants thereof.

Sec. 7. That all the rights and privileges in this ordinance granted shall be subject to an act entitled "An Act for the construction, maintenance and operation of water works for the purpose of supplying cities, towns and villages of the state with water," approved April 21, 1876, and the several supplements thereto and acts amendatory thereof.

Sec. 8. That said company shall commence work on the construction of the water works plant within two months after the passage of this ordinance, and have the plant completed within nine months from the date of the passage thereof; or, otherwise, all of the provisions of this ordinance shall cease, terminate, and become void without further notice.

Sec. 9. That said company shall not charge more than nineteen dollars annually, per plug, for fire purposes, when the town shall enter into contract for same, nor greater charges than the following for private consumers, viz: For the first spigot, \$6 per annum. For each additional spigot, \$1 per annum. For water under the meter system the sum of \$8 for 18,000 gallons, or \$10 for 30,000 gallons, and 25 cents for each 1000 gallons over 30,000, per annum; and said company may, if it so elect, supply all water under the meter system, instead of the spigot system of charges.

Sec. 10. That said company shall furnish water to the town at a rate equivalent to one-half of the minimum rates paid by private consumers, for all purposes other than fire purposes or otherwise specified in the proposals attached and made a part hereof.

Sec. 11. That the Town of Hammonton hereby reserves the right to purchase the said water plant at the expiration of ten years from and after said company shall have begun the construction of said plant, according to and upon the terms following, that is to say, the price to be paid therefor shall be determined by arbitrators, one to be appointed by said town, one to be appointed by said company, and one to be appointed by said town and said company.

Sec. 12. That the said company shall furnish all meters free to consumers of water.

Sec. 13. That this ordinance shall not be construed as effective unless the water works plant constructed by said company shall in all particulars be erected, constructed and operated so as to secure to the inhabitants of said town a water pressure of forty pounds to the square inch, and all of the advantages to be derived from the Board of Fire Underwriters and Adjusters by reason of the fact that the water supply is up to the full requirements for securing the reductions of premium rates in towns having a water supply.

Sec. 14. That this ordinance shall not become effective until said company shall have paid for the printing thereof.

Sec. 15. That all of the stipulations contained in the proposition of said company for a franchise shall become and be a part of this ordinance, and be here made a part thereof.

Sec. 16. That the said company shall give an acceptable bond of twenty thousand dollars to carry out the terms of this ordinance.

Sec. 17. That all the stipulations, conditions and agreements herein contained shall continue in force as long as the said company complies with the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 18. That this ordinance shall take effect from the date of the final passage thereof.

Supplements thereto and acts amendatory thereof, do hereby certify—

First, The name adopted by the said company is "The Hammonton Water Company."

Second, The amount of the capital stock of the said company is seventy-five thousand dollars, divided into fifteen hundred shares of fifty dollars each.

Third, The term of existence of said company is to be perpetual.

Fourth, The number of directors of said company shall be seven.

The names of those who shall manage the affairs of the company for the first year, or until their successors are elected and qualified, are — Cyrus D Jones, George S Horn, Thomas A Dunn, all residents of the city of Saratoga, in the county of Lackawanna, State of Pennsylvania, and Loami Monfort and Nelson J Ritter, of Hammonton, Atlantic County, State of New Jersey, and Nelson J Ritter and J F Crandall, of Atlantic City, N. J.

Fifth, The name of the town in and for which such works are to be constructed and the business carried on, is Hammonton, in the County of Atlantic.

The location of the principal office in this state is on Brilleve Avenue, in the Town of Hammonton, County of Atlantic.

The name of the agent therein and in charge thereof, upon whom process against this corporation may be served, is Samuel E. Brown.

The said Town of Hammonton has a population of not more than fifteen thousand and not less than five hundred inhabitants.

Resolved, That the consent of the Councilmen of the Town of Hammonton, in the County of Atlantic and State of New Jersey, be and the same is hereby given to Cyrus D Jones, George S Horn, and Thomas A Dunn, of the city of Saratoga, in the State of Pennsylvania, and to Loami Monfort and Samuel E Brown, of the Town of Hammonton, and Nelson J Ritter and Joseph F Crandall, of the city of Atlantic City, in the County of Atlantic and State of New Jersey, to associate themselves together as a body politic and corporate, under the name of the Hammonton Water Company, for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating water works for the purpose of supplying the town of Hammonton and the inhabitants thereof with water, in pursuance of the provisions of an Act entitled "An Act for the construction, maintenance and operation of water works for the purpose of supplying cities, towns and villages of this state with water," approved April 21, 1876, by the Legislature of the State of New Jersey, and the several supplements thereto and acts amendatory thereof, subject, nevertheless, to the following conditions and restrictions:

That they shall have the privilege of laying pipes along the streets, roads and alleys in the town and not unnecessarily obstruct public travel in laying mains or making connection thereto.

That they shall be held responsible for what ever damages may occur from the bursting of pipes and mains and from open trenches, or from any other cause happening from the negligence of the said company, its employees, agents or servants; that they shall set fire plugs from time to time in such places as Council may determine; provided, that this requirement shall not be construed to compel the said company to locate and set any fire plug or plugs at a greater distance than three hundred feet from any established service or supply pipe or line operated by the said company; and provided, further, if council shall at any time determine that it is necessary to establish any plug or plugs beyond the limits above specified, then and in that event the actual cost for the establishment and setting of any plug or plugs beyond the limits aforesaid shall be tendered and paid to the said company when the plug or plugs are so established and set as aforesaid.

That they shall, under the direction of council, furnish an adequate supply of water for two drinking fountains and troughs for the use of persons and animals, said fountains and troughs to be erected by the town, and shall supply all the water requisite and necessary for the use of the town hall and under the condition that the water so supplied as aforesaid shall be supplied free of any cost to the town of Hammonton and the inhabitants thereof; and provided further, that all water supplied for public schools or town purposes, other than through the fire plugs, shall be furnished to the said town for one-half of the minimum

rates at which water, at any time, is supplied to private consumers.

That they shall not charge more than nineteen dollars per plug per annum for fire purposes, nor greater charges than the following for private consumers, viz:

For the first spigot, \$6 per annum.

For each additional spigot, \$1 per annum.

For water under the meter system, the sum of \$8 for 18,000 gallons, or \$10 for 30,000 gallons, and 25 cents per 1000 gallons over 30,000, per annum; and said company may, if it so elect, supply all water under the meter, instead of the spigot system of charges.

That they shall commence work on the water works plant within two months after the passage of this resolution, and shall have the plant completed within nine months after the date of the passage hereof.

That the plant shall not be deemed to be complete until at least four and one-half miles of pipe have been laid and the water turned thereon, ready for service.

That they shall make extensions to their then existing mains whenever the revenue to be derived therefrom shall return an equivalent net revenue of seven per cent on the cost of said extensions; said extensions to be made under the direction of the council, but not to be construed to interfere with or to annul the provisions of any other portion of these resolutions.

That the said Town shall have the option of purchasing the said plant at any time after ten years from the date of the completion of the same, and the terms of said purchase to be set by arbitrators, one to be selected by the company, one to be selected by the town, and the third to be selected by these two.

That they shall give an acceptable bond to carry out the terms of this resolution.
