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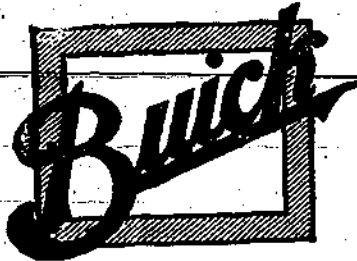
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AN ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE to change the lines, dimensions and grades of sidewalks and curbs on the following streets within the Town of Hammonton, to wit: Valley Avenue from Grape Street to Bellevue Avenue, on Grape Street from a point 400 feet from Central Avenue, east on Grape Street and from said point to Valley Avenue.

Be it ordained by the Town of Hammonton in Council assembled:
 Section 1. That the lines, dimensions and grades of sidewalks and curbs of and on Valley Avenue from Grape Street to Bellevue Avenue, on Grape Street from a point 400 feet from Central Avenue, east on Grape Street and from said point to Valley Avenue, within the Town of Hammonton, be, and the same are hereby changed, established and fixed in all respects in accordance with the maps, charts and specifications submitted to Council by J. C. Remington, Engineer, on the 30th day of June, 1915, which maps, charts, specifications and dimensions, in so far as they relate to the aforesaid streets, are included in this ordinance and annexed hereto and made a part hereof.
 Section 2. That all ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance, be, and the same are hereby repealed.
 Section 3. That this ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE.
 AN ORDINANCE to establish the lines, dimensions and grades of sidewalks and curbs on Packard Street, from Bellevue Avenue to Grape Street; on Peach Street from Central Avenue to Packard Street, all within the Town of Hammonton.
 Be it ordained by the Town of Hammonton, in Council assembled:
 Section 1. That the lines, dimensions and grades of sidewalks and curbs of and on Packard Street, from Bellevue Avenue to Grape Street, on Peach Street from Central Avenue to Packard Street, within the Town of Hammonton, be, and the same are hereby established and fixed in all respects in accordance with the maps, charts and specifications submitted to Council by J. C. Remington, Engineer, on the 30th day of June, 1915; which maps, charts, specifications and dimensions, in so far as they relate to the aforesaid streets, are included in this ordinance and annexed hereto and made a part hereof.
 Section 2. That all ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance, be, and the same are hereby repealed.
 Section 3. That this ordinance shall take effect immediately.

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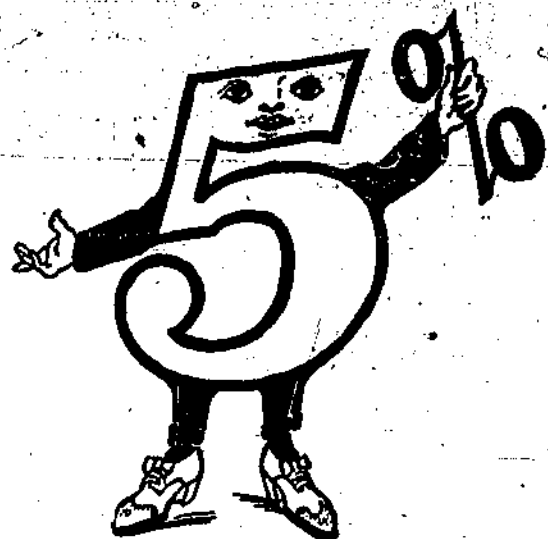
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
