We received a letter from "One of the Hammonton boys" at Sea Girt, in which he says: "We are all well. Give our best regards to all the Hammonton people, also thank them for what they have sent us here. There are eight of us, and two from Eim. They are not giving us much to eat,a piece of meat size of a walnut, a slice of bread, and a cup of coffee with neither milk nor sugar. But for what we buy and the bome people send us, we would look like living skeletons. We have a good Captain."

We cannot understand this general complaint of insufficient rations. We know from experience that an ordinary healthy man cannot eat all that Uncle Sam allows each one. What becomes of it? Somebody steals, evidently. Governor Voorhees, or some one in authority, whose words would be listened to, should investigate. It is enough for young men to give themselves to their country's service, without being made to suffer hunger while within their own State boundaries.

Later reports from the Camp, however, indicate that the ration trouble has been arranged.

The following letter will sufficiently explain itself:
