THIS WAS MORE LIKE.

HAMMONTON, 5; STEVENS, 2

The two batteries were pretty evenly
matched last Saturday, and we won
principally by good team work; and it
had to be good to beat that of our
opponents,—something that we hardly
dared dream of a few weeks ago. Sac-
rifice hits are increasing, but there is
still room for improvement in some
directions. Neither nine seemed to have
much difficulty in connecting, but safe
hits were nearly as scarce as mosquitoes
in January. Watt deserves special
commendation for his work at third,
especially his brilliant stops of red-hot
grounders.—Egan's in the fifth, and
King's in the ninth.

King started off with a bunt, moved
up on Wagner's push, took third on
Branson's single to center, and tallied
the first run on an overthrow.

Loveland reached third in the next
on a single and two stolen bases, but
died there on Setley's foul and Bever-
age's hit to King.

In third, Pierce was hit by a pitched
ball, Wagner sent to short, Branson
drew a base on balls; then Egan fouled
to left field, Tell made a fine catch and
a beautiful throw home,—too late, how-
ever, to cut off Pierce, who scored.

We commenced to score in the next.
Mathis sent a fine two-base drive to
right field, among the apple trees;
Watt's eye held good for four balls;
Setley sent thro' short, but was caught
on second by Pierce, who had covered
up Egan's tumble of Beverage's drive.
Somehow, at this time both Mathis and
Watt reached home in safety. Conley
closed with a pop to centre. With
three on bases, and none out, Pierce
lanned, King was declared out for
attempting to bunt third strike, and
Wayland was caught at home.

Tomlin scored in our inning, as the
result of a base on balls, a stolen base,
and sacrifice hits by Trent and Tell.

In the eighth inning we made two of
our four hits. Setley sent to centre,
slid down a base, reached third on a
passed ball, and came in on what Bever-
age intended for a sacrifice, but which
amounted to an error. Conley sent to
right, took his second and counted on a
wild throw to shut off Tomlin at first.

AN ORDINANCE to prevent and
remove all encroachments and nu-
isances in and upon any street or any
part thereof, in the Town of Hammon-
ton.

Introduced April 24, 1897.

Passed May 23, 1897.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town of
Hammonton, That it shall be unlawful to have,
keep, fasten, or affix by any means whatever,
any sign, bill, or advertisement to or upon
any shade or other tree standing on any of
the sidewalks or public streets in the Town of
Hammonton; and that any person who shall
violate this ordinance shall be subject to a
penalty of ten dollars or imprisonment for ten
days, to be sued for and recovered in manner
and form as provided by Section 23 of the
Town Charter.

Sec. 2. And be it ordained, That this ordi-
nance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE to prevent and prohibit the running at large of dogs in the Town of Hamonton.

Introduced April 24, 1897.
Passed May 29, 1897.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town of Hamonton, that every person residing in the Town of Hamonton who shall own, keep, or harbor any dogs, bitch or bitches, shall have the same registered and numbered with the Town Clerk, and shall place upon the neck of each dog or bitch kept or harbored a collar, having engraved thereon upon a metal or face the name of the owner of said dog or bitch, and the number thereof; and it shall be lawful for such person as may be authorized by Council for that purpose to kill any dog or bitch found straying off the owner's premises without such collar upon its neck.

Sec. 2. And be it ordained, That it shall be the duty of the Town Clerk to register the name of the owner of every dog or bitch, and the number, in a book provided for that purpose, numbering them in the order of owners applying for said registration, and giving to each person information of the registered number thereof. The person applying for registration shall pay the sum of One Dollar for each dog or bitch registered, of which the Clerk shall receive twelve cents for each registration; the balance to be applied to paying damage done by dogs to domestic animals or poultry, after the same shall have been appraised by two freeholders as authorized and directed by an act entitled "An act for the preservation of sheep," approved April 14, 1846, and the supplements thereto; and in case there is no damage, such balance to become a part of the general fund of the town.

Sec. 3. And be it ordained that the Pound Keeper and Town Marshal are hereby authorized and empowered to kill any dog, male or female, found straying off the owner's premises without such collar as above provided for on its neck.

Sec. 4. And be it ordained, That this ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town of Hammonton, that section third of an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to secure the safe and convenient use of the streets and sidewalks for the purpose for which they were laid out and dedicated, and to prevent riots, routs, disturbances, disorderly assemblages, and unlawful assemblies in any street, place, or house in Hammonton," passed January 25th, 1896, be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 2. And be it ordained, that this ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The above repeats only the section which prohibited carrying foreign flags or religious images in street processions. It will probably pass.
