## A FATAL ACCIDENT.

Miss Kate Battagliese, eighteen year old niece of Antonio Battagliese, from Philadelphia, with her twelve year old brother, Antonio, were visiting their uncle, in Hammon. On Wednesday the boy found a gun on the premises, and while amusing himself with it, one barrel was discharged, the contents entering the abdomen of his sister. Dr. Bitter was soon there, and seeing the serious nature of her wound, took her at once to St. Agnes Hospital, where everything possible was done for her, but she died that evening.

Chief Adams arrested the boy and locked him up, then tried to get word to the County Prosecutor, but could not locate him or his assistant. Justice Strouse held him in \$200 bond for later hearing, which was set for eleven o'clock on Thursday. In the meantime, the County Detective took up the matter with Judge Shinn, who gave the boy a hearing at one o'clock, at his office, in Atlantic City, and held him in \$1000 for the Grand Jury, and he went home to his widowed mother.

The little fellow was nearly frantic with grief and horror over his unintentional crime, wishing that he had been the victim. The popular opinion is that he who left that loaded gun where any one could get hold of it, is in reality more blameworthy than the boy who fired it.

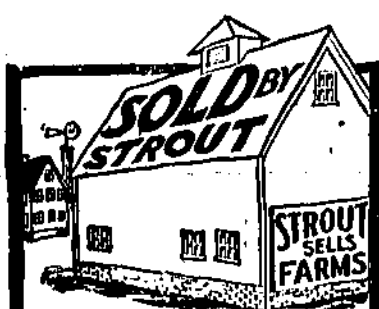

## More about Sewers.

Early this week, property owners each received two postal cards from the Town Solicitor, H. F. Stockwell, informing them that the Assessment Commissioners had fixed the amount named thereon as his proportion of the cost of the town sewer system, added to \$9.65 for his house connection. One man (and they say others) received a third card, on which was written "Prospective Benefits," and an amount named, to be paid some time in the future, when said benefits have been materialized. A verbal explanation given is that there are no water mains on the streets whereon said "prospective" assessment is laid; but there may be pipes laid there sometime, and then the owner must pass out the cash called for.

Did you ever hear of anything like that?—Perhaps it's a pointer for our regular assessors. Here is a vacant lot, on which there may be a ten thousand dollar house built, in the bye-and-bye. Send the owner a tax-bill to-day, payable when the "prospective" house is built; and add the value of the "prospective" piano, horse or automobile. It may help (?) to pay this year's expenses!

We are told that the commissioners divided the town into zones, estimating the need of sewerage in each, and based "special benefit" assessments accordingly. A good idea, that, if the law under which they are working sustains it.

We know that the commissioners are tired of their job, and we are not surprised; but they might have been relieved, of much labor by obeying the mandate of the voters, expressed in a public meeting, after prolonged debate and explanation, and placed the entire cost on the Town at large. As it stands, we have heard more complaint concerning this second report than of the first.

They claim to have cut their "special benefit" assessments about one-half; yet we know of one owner whose second notice varies little from the first; and we hear of others where the reduction is more than one-half. Apparently, mathematics has ceased to be one of the exact sciences.

We hope that a strong delegation of Hammonitonians will be in the Court room on the day of hearing, September 1st, and that the Judge will cancel the report and order the entire sewer cost paid by the Town at large. Homeholders can afford to pay a good sewer rate each year, until the bonds are paid, rather than pay largely for the sewers to-day, which will benefit several generations after us.

## About the Fruit Blight.

At the meeting of the New Jersey State Horticultural Society held at Hammoniton on July 14th, the matter of obtaining Federal aid in combating the blight that is devastating fruit trees along the Atlantic coast, resulting in a heavy financial loss to the fruit growers of South Jersey, was given very serious consideration, and a resolution was adopted asking that the Department of Agriculture at Washington take an active hand in the work, as it seemed to be getting beyond the control of the individual states.

The Society solicited the aid of Congressman Bacharach, and as a result of his attention to their request, he has secured the services of the best experts of the Department. These men have made a special study of the fruit blight for many years, and have had some very recent experience in the control of the disease.

The experts will visit this district on Monday, Aug. 2nd, and will call on Mr. Howard G. Taylor, Secretary of the State Society, at Riverton, N. J., at whose command they will place their services. All who are interested in the visit of these experts should get in touch with Mr. Taylor immediately.

It is hoped that as a result of the efforts of Congressman Bacharach in getting these men into the district, the disease which now threatens the fruit industry here will soon be gotten under control.

County offered to build "aprons" and concrete gutters at corners of Central and Gros; Central and Third, and Vine and Egg Harbor Road, if Town would pay its half. Voted to do so, as it is difficult to drain those low spots.

Three thousand certified brick left on Mr. Jannetti's hands were offered Town at a fair price, and the same were ordered purchased. Council then went into Committee of the whole, to consider finances and other equally necessary subjects; and reporters adjourned at ten o'clock.

Dusting Strawberry Weevil.

The work carried on last spring to find some spray or dust to control the strawberry weevil was not completed until last Friday, the 23rd, at which time Dr. T. J. Headlee, State Entomologist, and Mr. Pough, of the Union Sulphur Company, assisted the County Demonstrator in dusting one-eighth of an acre, to find the actual cost of applying material, and cost of dust per acre.

A new dust machine was tried, which proved very satisfactory, and which covered an acre in less than one hour. Counting the cost of material and one man's time, it will cost less than ten dollars to spray one acre of strawberries; and it was proven the past season that by spraying, there would be a saving of at least half the crop, and in many cases, two-thirds of the crop.

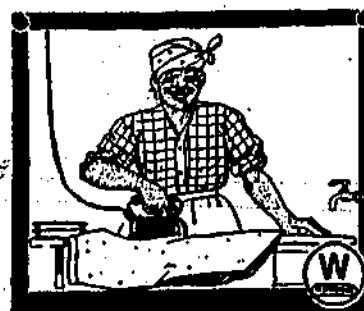
