Angelo Saggionio was riding his  
wheel on Sunday, near the Elvins cor-  
ner. An automobile came up back of  
him, and being unable to pass at that  
point, ran very slowly, awaiting an op-  
portunity. But, as we are told, the bi-  
cyclist became "rattled," and his wheel  
was struck by the auto, which ran over  
Angelo, inflicting some severe bruises.  
The injured man demanded two thou-  
sand-dollar damages, later reduced one-  
half, and finally decided to accept one  
hundred, but was too late, as the mat-  
ter had been placed in the hands of a  
claims committee of the automobile or-  
ganization.

Lightning struck several places  
last Saturday. For the second time,  
John Dilger's chimney was the centre  
of attraction, a hole being made in the  
side and plastering torn off in the house.  
About two o'clock Louis Pezzuto's  
bar, on Basin Road, was struck, and  
fired to the ground, killing a horse.  
Both fire companies turned out and  
rendered what assistance was possible.  
No insurance, we are told.

northward in an automobile. When

damaged.

About 7.30 o'clock last Saturday  
morning, during the storm, the Bell's  
wire-chief, Alfred Sutton, received a  
shock while thirty-five feet up a pole,  
near Nicolai's factory corner, dropping  
him head first to the ground. Fortu-  
nately, the local wires broke his fall, and  
turned him over, thus saving his neck.  
A shoulder blade, a rib, and some inter-  
nal injuries, as well as bruises, resulted;  
but on Friday his condition was favor-  
able.

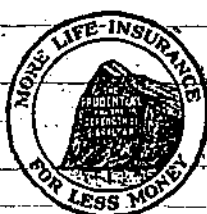
