## Town Council Meeting.

A special meeting of the Town Council was held on Monday evening,—the special topic for consideration being the method of making appropriations for 1914. A law was passed a year ago, placing this duty upon the Council, but not being entirely satisfied that this applied to Hammonton the amounts were placed before the voters, and carried. It looks now, however, as though Town Council would have to shoulder the responsibility. The Solicitor has been asked to instruct Council whether the law is mandatory.

The Solicitor has also been asked whose duty it is to keep in repair the sluice-way at the "dam"—the owner of the water-right, or the Town.

## Wounded by a Revolver.

Harry C. Brown was shot by an unknown party, Monday evening last, the ball entering near his left arm-pit, and followed the shoulder bone to the back. Dr. Bitler was called in, but failed to locate the lead, and took him to the hospital on Tuesday morning, where the X-rays showed the ball.

No one appears to know much about it, but from the various stories in circulation we gather what seems to be the most likely version.

Mr. Brown (a neighbor) keeps a dog that has the too common habit of chasing and barking at passing vehicles. One party, a boy, who had been troubled by the dog, threatened to shoot him. On Monday evening, as Mr. B. came out of the house, he saw two bicycles passing, one with a light, one without, and a moment later heard the report of a revolver from that direction, and felt the sting of the bullet. He could not recognize the riders, does not know who fired the shot, and there were no other witnesses. Later, the boy who made the threat was arrested and taken before Justice Cartou; but there was no direct evidence, and he was held in bond to await developments. On Tuesday evening another suspect was examined, but there was no evidence to sustain a charge. Thursday eve'g, Antonio Berenato, 21 years old, and Joseph his 17 years old brother, were taken before Justice Strouse, and held in \$500 and \$200 for court.

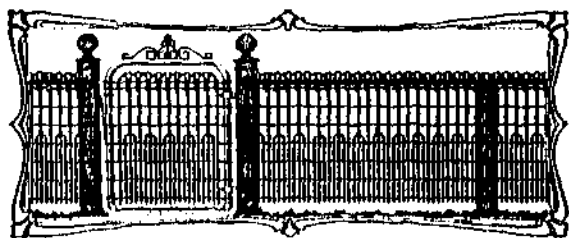

## Another Hammontonian Advanced.

The movement for the re-organiza-  
tion of Hazelton Brothers, New  
York, which has been in progress  
for some time past, will be effected  
this week. H. C. Pressey, who is  
well known to the piano trade as  
the former vice-president of the  
Lester Piano Co., Philadelphia, has  
secured an interest in the business  
of Hazelton Bros., and under the  
re-organization he will become treas-  
urer of the company. Samuel  
Hazelton will be president, and  
Halsey Hazelton secretary of the  
corporation. Mr. Pressey has not  
been actively identified with the  
piano trade since his retirement  
from the Lester Co., a year ago,  
but he expressed himself recently  
as being very desirous of getting  
into the harness again and stated  
that he could not be satisfied out-  
side his accustomed field. He is a  
thorough piano man, enterprising  
and energetic, and the re-organiza-  
tion plans contemplate an aggres-  
sive policy in the conduct of the  
Hazelton business. He has always  
maintained the policy that the  
highest grade pianos are none too  
good, and this policy will be con-  
tinued in his new connection.

The firm of Hazelton Bros. is one  
of the oldest and most prominent  
among the piano manufacturers  
of the United States. It was found-  
ed in 1839 by Henry and Frederick  
Hazelton, men of wide experience  
and ability in piano building. In  
1892 Henry Hazelton died, and  
three years later the death of Fred-  
erick occurred. Just about the  
time of the death of Henry, John  
Hazelton, who had been a member  
of the firm for over thirty years,  
retired. The business was then  
left practically in the hands of the  
nephew of the founders, Samuel  
Hazelton, who is now its president.
