N ORDINANCE regulating and A directing the construction and re-pair of sidewalks in the Town of Hammonton, within the territory bounded by Main Road to Grand Street, and Fair-view Avenue to Park Avenue, both sides of all streets inclusive, and the materials to be used in such construction and repair, and appointing Commissioners to carry this ordinance into effect.

## Introduced June 29th, 1901. Passed July 27th, 1901.

Section 1. Bo is ordained by the Town Oouncil of the Town of Hammonton, that all owners of any lot, alloy, or passage way within the territory bounded by Main Road to Grand Street, and Fairjan Aronne to Park. Awanto, both sides of all streets inclusive, whell and then the hard discussion and Avenue, both sides of all stretts inclusive-shall, and they are boreby directed and re-quired to repair the sidewalks in front of or adjoining such-lot, alley-or passage way-within sixty days from the date this ordinance shall take offest: See, 2. Sidewalks shall be pared in whole or in part with bursten front and in whole

Sec. 2. Sidewalks shall be paved in whole or in part with bluestcue flagging, slate, brick, tement, gravel, sephalt, or artificial store. The middle line of paring, not cavaring the entire sidewalk aball agree with the middle line of the sidewalk. And all eidewalks shall be of such width and thickness as the High-ways Committee of Council-built direct. All rules and regulations mude by said Committee. shall be printed, and shall be so made/as to secure a sidewalk of uniform width and simi-larity of surface in each block between later secting streets, and shall be made by virtue of the authority hereby conterred, and subject of the authority hereby conferred, and subject to all of the terms of this ordinance. Byrnes shall be and are here-by appointed as Commissioners to examine into-the=master=of=paving\_said\_sidewalks; Into-the-marter\_of\_paving\_sid\_sidewalks; and they shall cause a map or survey to be made of said improvements, distinguishing show lot or parcel by number on said map; and they shall estimate the whole cost of said improvement according to the best of their judgment, and shall assues such estimated costs upon the said lands fronting on said imprivements, and report the names of the owners of the lots or parcels as far as practi-cable, with the amount assessed to each, and cable, with the amount assessed to each, and shall file said report and map with the Clork of the Town within thirty days after their appointment. The Clork shall give notice of the filing of any such report and map within ten days after the same shall be filed with him, in one of the Atlantic County newspapers circutating in said Town, and notices put in five of the most public placer in said Town for ten days: and unless within thirty days after the fling of said report the owners of two-thirds of the lands to be assessed for such improvements shall, five with the Clerk of the cable, with the amount assessed to each two-thirds of the lands to be asso-and for such improvements shall, fie with the Cierk of the Town a remonstrance signed by them or their agent lawfully authorized, said Councilmen, shall proceed to excents suid improvement; but if such remonstrance shall be filed, the Councilmen shall proceed no further in such improvement under that application, and sil costs and expenses incurred by the Council in such proceedings shall be paid to the Town by stuch potitioners of such improvements; and the Councilmen may make such regulations touching the receiving and proceeding upon such potition, and socurity for the expenses there f, as they may deem proper. Sec. 4. That all expenses and costs of pro-occulings and improvements provided for in
