## No Prize Fight Wanted.

Last week, posters announced a boxing match of six rounds, between Joe Grimm and Eddie Haney, of Philada. in Bellevue Hall, last Saturday evening.

Now, Hammonton didn't want any such demoralizing exhibition, and soon made that fact manifest. Town Clerk Seely wrote to Solicitor Stockwell, who sent a section of the general crimes act of 1898, which makes such a show a misdemeanor. Mr. Dilger, Chairman of the Law and Order Committee, consulted Mayor Austin, then instructed Chief Adams to prevent the fight, which he did, by notifying Grimm in person. Joe tried to argue, but the Chief said, "Cut it out; those are my orders." Joe replied "I will," and he did. The Mayor was prepared to enforce his order, having a sufficient force present; but Grimm took warning, and procured a license for a vaudeville performance, consisting of bag-punching, music, a few other stunts, a speech, and that was all.

Joe, it is said, felt sore because his friends did not appear at the show. We heartily commend the action of our town officials,— they did right. There is nothing elevating in the sight of two men dancing about, each striving to so pound the other that he is disqualified for further struggle. That might do for bull-dogs or game cocks, but men should have more elevated ideas of amusement.

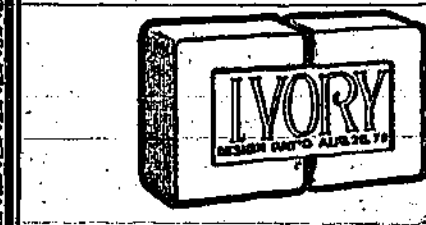

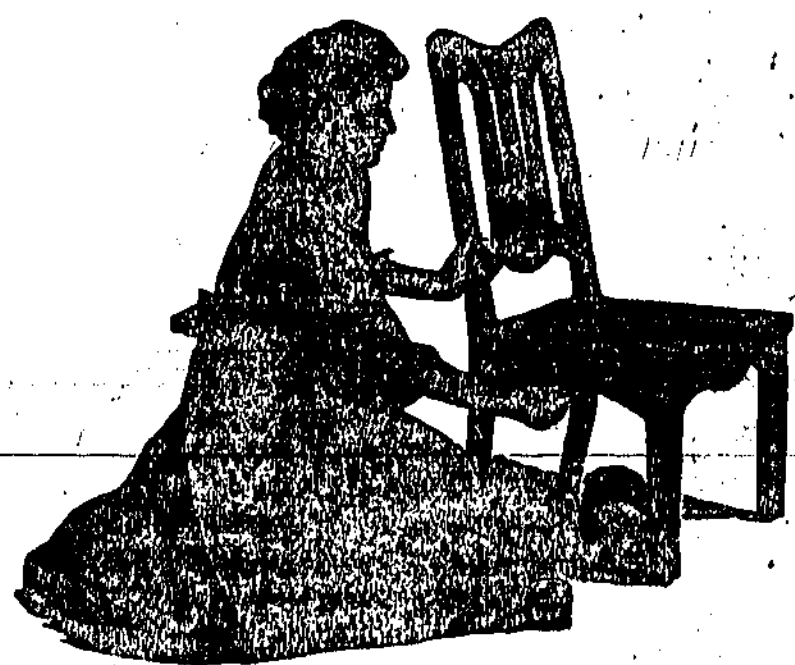

## AN ORDINANCE for the Regulation of places licensed in the Town of Hammonton for sale of intoxicating liquors and beverages.

Introduced June 14, 1910.  
Passed July 31, 1910.

Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the Town of Hammonton in Council assembled, that on and after the fourteenth day of June, nineteen hundred and ten, the bars of all saloons, inns and taverns licensed within the Town of Hammonton shall be and remain closed between the hours of 11 P.M. and 5 A.M., and that between such hours no intoxicating liquors or beverages shall be sold, or otherwise disposed of, in or upon premises of such licensed saloons, inns and taverns.

Sec. 2. That any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine not exceeding ten dollars, or imprisonment for any more than ten days for each and every violation.

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance be, and the same are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately.
