#### Automobiles and the Law.

On a railroad, the trains run exclusively upon steel rails, securely anchored to a prepared road bed. Each wheel is provided with a flange which prevents it from leaving the rail, even if running at great speed.

The locomotive is driven by a man who has served for many years in minor positions, and is only given the responsibility of a train after proving his knowledge of the machinery which he is to control, and his ability to handle and care for it.

The automobile is run upon ordinary roads, highways which are also used by wagons and carriages of all sorts, and by pedestrians. From one side of the road to another, it veers.

It speeds often equals that of an express train, and one is often puzzled as to how to escape its mad rush. And this, too, under the control of a man, woman or boy, who a few weeks ago knew little of nothing of the powerful machine in their charge, and even now may be unable to replace a lost bolt, or repair the slightest damage.

Because of these elements of danger to driver, passenger, team, or pedestrian, the State has stepped in and enacted laws, of which many complain, but which are absolutely necessary under the peculiar circumstances. Violations of these regulations bring disaster, and their enforcement should not be considered a hardship.

Communities through which these great machines go, rushing by ought not to be expected to surrender their rights to strangers who seem to have no care for others, and only aim to make quick passages for their own gratification.

It seems necessary to protect many of these reckless motorists from the results of their own foolish ambition, as well as the public from danger.
