The Township Law.

For the information of those interest-
ed, I give below a brief review of the
law proposed in place of our present
charter:

We become the "Township of Ham-
monton" (not town), and the fiscal year
begins February 1st, and ends January
31st.

The annual town election must be
held on the second Tuesday in March,
to elect township clerk, assessor, col-
lector, a member of the board of appeals,
overseer of poor, one or more pound
keepers, and (after the first election) one
member of the township committee,
each year.

The Township Committee consist of
three, each to hold office for three years,
—one elected each year. It takes the
place of our Council.

The committee may appoint a town-
ship attorney or township engineer,
neither of whom need be resident here.

The annual report of township com-
mittee must be made to township clerk
on or before Feb. 10th of each year.
The members of committee receive two
dollars per day, but not to exceed \$200
each per year. Township Clerk gets
three dollars per day, or such annual
compensation as committee, by ordi-
nance, may fix upon. He serves three
years. Duties nearly the same as now.
Treasurer is appointed by township
committee, and performs the usual
duties. He may be selected from the
committee, or the collector, or any
citizen may serve.

Assessors, overseers of poor, members
of board of appeals, serve three years.

Violations of town ordinances are
punished severely. As much as \$100
fine and ninety days in lock-up or jail
may be inflicted by a justice.

Appropriations are voted at the
annual township elections—at the polls,
—no town meetings.

Township Committee fixes all salaries
or compensation for all service not fixed
by law.

The Township Committee has power
to pass ordinances for preserving the
peace; prevent cruelty to animals;
licensing vehicles; allow rebate of taxes
for wide tire vehicles; establish grades
of streets, etc.; punish immoderate
driving; regulate tearing up of streets;
provide for protection of property; pre-
vent animals (including dogs) from run-
ning at large; to provide for destruc-
tion of dogs running at large and fix
the fees, etc., for their redemption;
contract for sprinkling streets; inspect
all accounts of officers; sell town prop-
erty by consent of voters; compel
owners to keep sidewalks in order; as-
sess property owners for improvement
of streets, sidewalks, etc., adjoining
their properties; regulate fire depart-
ment; establish police department if
voters grant money; if no police depart-
ment is established may appoint persons
as policemen, to be discharged at will;
regulate sewerage and maintain sewers;
provide water supply and light without
consent of voters; condemn lands for
public improvements under certain con-
ditions; borrow money in anticipation
of taxes; secure payment with bonds
not exceeding the appropriation; estab-
lish sinking fund commission; license
pedlars, etc.

All township officers in office, whose
offices are continued by this act (except
township committee), shall continue in
their respective offices until the second
Saturday after the second Tuesday in
March nearest the expiration of their
terms.

A large list is given of laws that have
been replaced.

REMARKS.

There is nothing in the new law
about town meetings; nothing about
granting licenses to sell liquor; nothing
about overseer of highways. These
matters are fixed by other special laws.

All licenses are to be granted by the
courts.

The township committee will appoint
overseer of highways and have control.
(The law doesn't say so.—ED.)

Opinions differ on the law. It is
claimed that the revenue from licensed

hotels goes to the county, the town re-
ceiving only such moneys as may be
collected by its officers from other
sources.

The three members of township com-
mittee may receive \$600 and the town-
ship clerk \$913, but will probably re-
ceive less.

This law does not state how we are
to proceed to become a "township" in-
stead of a "town" or how the vote is to
be taken; but that is probably provided
for in some other act.

In the above review, the methods, etc.,
of conducting operations under the act
have been eliminated for lack of space.

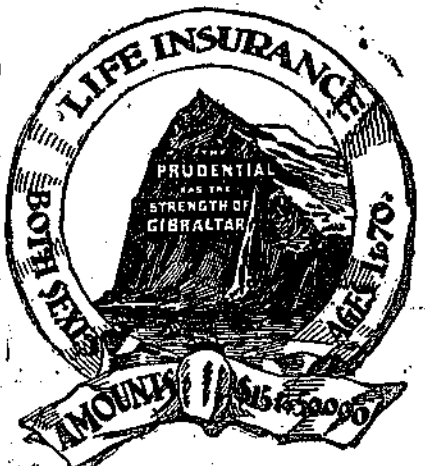

AN ORDINANCE to amend an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to Provide a Supply of Water for the Town of Hammonton."

Section 1. Be it enacted, That Section 12 of the ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to Provide a Supply of Water for the Town of Hammonton," passed June 24, 1899, be and the same be amended to read as follows: That this ordinance shall not be construed as effective unless the said water works plant shall be a constructed and secure to the property owners of the Town of Hammonton all the rates and allowances given by the Board of Fire Underwriters and Adjusters in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 2. That this ordinance shall take effect from the date of the first meeting thereof.
