The Township Law.

For the information of those interested, I give below a brief review of the law proposed in place of our present

We become the "Township of Hammonton" (not town), and the fiscal year | ceive leas. begins February 1st, and ends January This law does not state how we are

held on the second Tuesday in March, to elect township clerk, assessors, collector, a member of the board of appeals, overseer of poor, one or more (pound keepers, and (after the first election) one member of the township committee, each year.

The Township Committee consist of three, each to hold office for three years, -one elected each year. It takes the place of our Council.

The committee may appoint a townabip attorney or township engineer, neither of whom need be resident here.

The annual report of township committee must be made to township clerk on or before Feb. 10th of each year. The members of committee receive two dollars per day, but not to exceed \$200 each per year. Township Clerk gets three dollars per day, or such annual compensation as committee, by ordinance, may fix upon. He serves three years. Duties nearly the same as now.

Treasurer is appointed by township committee, and performs the usual duties. He may be selected from the committee, or the collector, or any citizen may serve.

Assessors, overseers of poor, members of board of appeals, serve three years.

Violations of town ordinances are punished severely. As much as \$100 fine and ninety days in lock-up or jail may be inflicted by a justice.

Appropriations are voted at the annual township elections—at the polls, -no town meetings.

Township Committee fixes all salaries or compensation for all service not fixed by haw.

The Township Committee has power to pass ordinances for preserving the peace; prevent cruelty to animals; licensing vehicles; allow rebate of taxes for wide tire vehicles; establish grades of streets, etc.; punish immoderate driving; regulate tearing up of streets; provide for protection of property; prevent animals (including dogs) from running at large; to provide for descruction of dogs running at large and flx the fees, etc., for their redemption; contract for sprinkling streets; inspect all accounts of officers; sell town proporty by concent of voters; compel owners to keep sidewalks in order; assess property owners for improvement of streets, sidewalks, etc., adjoining their properties; regulate fire department; establish police department if voters grant money; if no police department is established may appoint persons as policemon, to be discharged at will; rogulate sewerage and maintain sewers; provide water supply and light without consent of voters; condemn lands for public improvements under certain conditions; borrow money in anticipation of taxes; secure payment with bonds not exceeding the appropriation; establish sinking fund commission; license pedlars, etc.

All township officers in office, whose offices are continued by this act (except township committee), shall continue in thair respective affices until the second Saturday after the second Tuesday in March nearest the expiration of their







SANITARY CODE

OF THE

Town of Hammonton

Adopted Aug. 3, 1899.

The Local Board of Health of the Town of Hammonton, County of Atlantic, by virtue of the provisions of the act of the legislature of New Jerrey, entitled "An Act to establish in this State Boards of Health and a Bureau of Vital Statistics, and to define their respective powers and dutles," approved March 31, 1867, and of other acts, ordains:

Section 1. That whatever is dangerous to human health, or whatever renders the ground, the water, the air, or food, a hazard or an in-jury to human health, is hereby declared to be

jury to human health, is hereby declared to be a nuisance, and any person or persons creating or maintaining, or adding in the creation or maintenance of any such nuisance, shall be liable to a penalty of Ten Dollars.

Ecc. 2. That any person who shall carcless ly, negligently, or wilfully aid in or contribute to the delay of any act dangerous to life or detrimental to the health of any human being, except for justifiable motives and for adequate reasons, or who shall omit any precaution reasonable and proper to prevent or remove danger or detriment to life or health of any human being, shall be liable to a penalty of human being, shall be liable to a penalty of

danger or detriment to life or health of any human being, shall be liable to a penalty of Ten Dollars.

Sec. 3. That the sale of any meat or vegetable food or druk that is us wholesome or unfit for food is hereby prohibited; any person or persons making any such sale as aforesaid, shall be liable to a penalty of Ten Dollars.

CONTAGIOUS AND INFECTIOUS DISEASES

Sec. 4. That any physician, midwife, nurse, clergyman, magistrate, or other person who shall officiate at any bitch, death or marriage in the Town of Hammorton, and who shall neglect to make return thereof to the proper officer, according to law, and any physician who shall neglect or refuse to report in writing within 24 hours to the Local Board of Health any case of contagious or infectious disease which said physician has prescribed for or attended for the first time since having such disease during the preceding 24 hours, and shall state in such report the specific name of the disease, the full name, race, age, and son of the patient, his or her residence as precisely as possible, the name of the school which the patient attends, or the factory or workshep at which he or she is employed, if any, the source of contagion or intection if it can be secertained and such state for the factory and such sense. Sec. 4. That any physician, midwife, nurse pat ent attends, or the factory or workshop at which he or she is employed, if any, the source of contagion or injection if it can be ascertained, and such other facts as may be deemed of importance for the information of the Board. And every physician shall report, in writing, to the Board of Health, the death of any of his patients who shall have died in the Town of Hammonton, of any contagions or in fectious disease, within 24 hours thereafter, and shall state in such report the specific name and type of the disease. And every householder, and every keeper of any boarding house, lodging house, inn or horel, shall, in case there of 'no physician being in attendance, report to the Board of Health the same particulars in the same manner as is required of physicians during any period when said Board shall require notice of such cases to be given, shall for each and every failure to make such return or report be liable to a penalty of Twenty-five deliars.

Sec. 5. That the keeping of any dwelling house in which there is or has been any polluting or communicable disease without thorough airing, cleansing and disinfection, is hereby probibited. Whenever the Board of Health in this town shall knew of a pureousick with any contagious or infectious disease in a house, building or locality, from which the interests of publis health require his removal, it may direct the removal of said person to a suitable place, when said removal can be made without undue risk to the purson sick, and may cause the premises where such person has been sick

That there shall not be a public or church funeral of any porson who has died of small pox, diphtheria, zearlet fever, typhus fever, or Asiatic choicen, but the funeral of such person shall be private; and it shall not be lawful to invite or permit at the funeral, or at any services connected therewith, of any porson who has died of any of the diseases above mentioned, or of any contagious, peatilential, or infectious disease, any purson who attendance is not recessary, or to whom there is danger of contagion thereby; and any violation of this section shall be punishable by a fine of Frity bollars.
