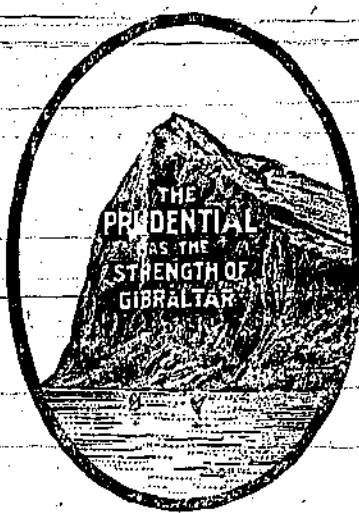

THOSE WATER BONDS.

At last this long drawn-out matter of water bonds has been closed for ten years, by the delivery of the sixty thousand dollars worth of precious paper to the Peoples Bank of Hammoncton.
 This interesting incident occurred on Saturday last.
 It may not be generally known that the vast amount of work done by the Water Commissioners has been paid for by orders on the Town Treasurer, but as he had no water money, he endorsed and dated all these orders, and the Bank paid them, charging the Town five per cent. interest for so doing. In settling for these orders, last Saturday, Treasurer Davis gave the Bank a check for something more than fifty-two thousand dollars, leaving us some seven thousand dollars as working capital.

An unfortunate combination of happenings, last week, resulted in an order from the Water Commissioners, by postal cards mailed to all patrons, forbidding the use of water for street sprinkling, pave washing, lawn or truck patch irrigation, until further notice. The engineer has noticed that the water supply has been decreasing for several weeks. The main shaft of the original compressor broke short off, near the crank; but the new compressor was in place, ready for business. Mr. Nelson was taken sick, and Mr. Mansfield took his place as engineer. Mr. Kienner, who sank our wells, was sent for, but could see no reason why the flow of water should be less than at first. It took Hammoncton experts to discover the cause. The air pipe was drawn from the deepest well, and found so badly rusted that but little wind or water could be forced through. The screen was cleaned, the old black pipe replaced by galvanized iron, and that well is again doing good service. There appeared to be plenty of water. We understand that the other wells will be similarly treated, and we hope to see the waterworks soon working.
