10 a. m., Friday. At one time early this week, twelve cases of diphtheria and one of typhoid were under quarantine, with the nearest case of paralysis in Atlantic City.

At present, three houses are under quarantine for diphtheria, no new cases having developed since last Friday. One new case of typhoid has been reported.

We feel that our people are unnecessarily alarmed over present outbreak, as we have it entirely under control. The churches and movies are again open, but we advise all children to keep away from both.

Council met in regular session on Wednesday evening.
 Law and Order Committee recommended that the dog pound be moved—that it is a nuisance.

Clerk reported receipts, licenses, etc., the sum of \$116.69.
 Overseer of Poor reported a busy month of business.

The Chief of Police reported six arrests for drunkenness, five for miscellaneous offenses, and seven free lodgers.

Tony Pinto's application for renewal of pool-room license was granted.

Mr. Baulig asked that gutter be laid in front of his property, on Pleasant Street, he intending to lay one on Washington Street and curbs on both streets. Referred to Highway Committee.

Board of Health called attention to cruel method of killing dogs at the pound; also to the shallow burying. Law and Order Committee will investigate.

County Engineer Nelson advised against the digging into Bellevue Avenue, for cables, etc.

Canoe Club request for lease of land and privilege of erecting new house at left of water front, in the Park. They stated that there are over twenty-five canoes on the Lake, and more in prospect. Referred to Finance Committee, to draw lease according to law, if they have the power to do so.

Engineer Remington urged the establishment of a drainage system on and about Packard Street and School lane, covering 150 acres, before Bellevue Avenue is paved. Estimated cost, about \$5000.

Appropriation ordinance passed second and final reading.

Resolution was adopted, authorizing change of incandescent lamp at Horton and Orchard to arc.

Solicitor was authorized to look after details relating to Bellevue paving, which will probably be commenced by November 1st.

Clerk was instructed to place advertisement for new fire apparatus for both companies.

Officer Myers will carry a new electric flash lamp.

Adjourned at 10:20.
