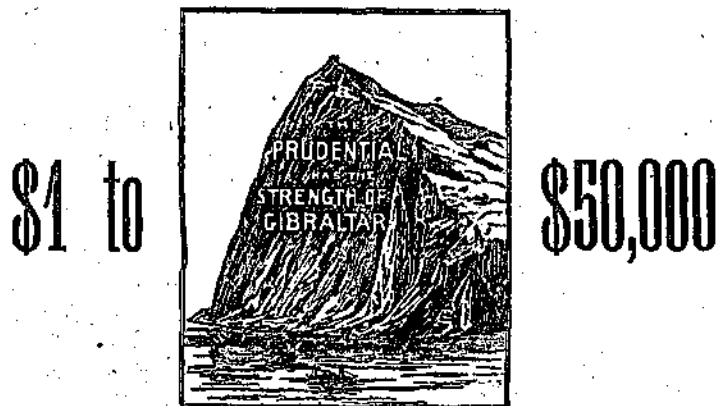

### PEACE IN SIGHT.

On Wednesday, M. Cambon presented to President McKinley the Spanish government's reply to the American conditions of peace. In substance, and in nearly every detail, it is an acceptance of our terms. The officials had a long conference, and later, Secretary Day prepared and submitted to M. Cambon a "protocol," which covers every phase of the peace question that the five American and five Spanish commissioners will have to consider when they meet, in Paris. This has been sent to Madrid, and if approved, will be signed for Spain by M. Cambon, and hostilities will cease, Cuba, Porto Rico, and other West Indian islands to be evacuated by Spanish troops as rapidly as possible. It is thought that this hoped for consummation will be reached by to-day. Still, there is time for the Spaniards to withdraw, and take the consequences.

At Porto Rico there has been some sharp fighting with the usual result. Gen. Miles says he needs no more troops there, and is marching steadily toward San Juan.

In the Philippine, close to Manila, our troops were attacked on a dark stormy night by Spanish troops, who planned to surprise the Americans and drive them into the sea. A fierce battle was fought, our troops did not yield, and the enemy were driven back with heavy loss. Sixteen Americans were killed and many wounded.

Many of our soldiers at Santiago have started on the homeward voyage, and more are to follow. A lot of Spanish prisoners, mostly wounded and sick, are on the way across the sea, and the balance will go as soon as transports are ready to take them.

Friday morning papers bring us the welcome news that the Spanish cabinet have approved the protocol, and given M. Cambon full authority to sign it in their behalf. No doubt this will have been done before this reaches any of our readers. This means an immediate cessation of hostilities. In fact, it is rumored that the President has already telegraphed to commanders in Cuba, Porto Rico, and the Philippines, to at once suspend operations.

JOHN T. FRENCH, P. M.

In the recent naval battle off Santiago, of the vessels engaged, the battleships "Iowa," "Indiana," "Massachusetts," as well as the armored cruiser "New York," were built by "The William Cramp & Sons Ship and Engine Building Co." The "Texas" was built at Norfolk Navy Yard, the "Oregon" at San Francisco. So were that to the Philadelphia firm belongs the honor of having furnished to the government a majority of the magnificent vessels that achieved our naval victory. They have doubtless added to their reputation by this valuable addition to our navy.

Justice Joe. H. Garton had an exciting time on Tuesday evening. He received a telegram from Bridgeton that one William Shank (or Jones) was wanted on a criminal charge, stating that he might be with relatives in Hammoncton and directing that he be arrested on sight. Garton located his man at the family home, on Central Avenue, and called there for him.

When the young man learned what was wanted he attempted to escape, members of the family endeavoring to detain the officer. There was a free fight for a minute or so, but Garton persuaded them that resistance was useless, and led his prisoner away. When near the intersection of Central and Valley Avenues, Shank made a break for the woods. An order to "halt" made him run the faster, and Garton fired a revolver shot over his head, with no effect; then, after a shouted warning he fired a second shot, at about seventy yards distance, hitting him in the calf of the leg, stopping his progress. The wounded man was taken to Dr. Crowell's office, and by his advice was placed in charge of Constable Shackley, to be taken home and there treated by the surgeon. But on the way the prisoner again tried to escape, with his brother's assistance, and was then taken to the lock-up (or the Council room adjoining), a cot prepared, and Dr. Crowell there attended him, and he was held to wait an officer from Bridgeton, who came Wednesday noon and took the prisoner away.

Miss Marie Welser, daughter of George and Mary Welser, died Tuesday, August 2nd. It may be gratifying to her Hammoncton friends to know that when she was informed that there was no chance of recovery she accepted the situation and began to indicate some things she desired to have done after her death. She named the hymns to be sung, left loving messages to dear ones, spoke of her hope in Christ, and the bright home awaiting her, and expressed a strong desire to have all her loved ones meet her Heaven, and like a conqueror who has fought the last battle, she fell asleep in Jesus, in the triumphant faith that the Gospel alone furishes, after weary weeks of suffering. Funeral services were held on Saturday last, conducted by Rev. W. N. Ogborn, assisted by Mr. Ryan, of Rosedale. Misses Eva Carlaw and Miss Ethel Davies sang two appropriate selections, while Miss Marietta Tilton presided at the organ. Miss Helser's employer bore testimony to her uprightness and a number of beautiful floral emblems were presented.

The United States will emerge from this war with territory in three zones—the arctic, the temperate and the torrid. But two other countries in the world hold land in three zones, and it is a singular fact that little Denmark is one of the two. Great Britain, however, is the great world-power. She possesses territory in the north frigid zone and the south frigid zone, in the north temperate zone and the south temperate zone, and in the torrid zone on both sides of the equator.

A canal through the Isthmus is a necessity, but it is not necessary for the United States to go into partnership with a private company to build it. Remember the Pacific Railroad.

Uncle Sam started a campaign of education for Spain in returning the surrendered Santiago troops. There is an amazingly large percentage of ignorance among the Spaniards that nothing can so well overcome as the return of the defeated soldiery and the explanation that will inevitably follow their home coming.

Speaker Reed is still talking about the traditions of our wine forerethers. If our wise forerethers had over a cup of the United States wine over by what it is now, they would have established a different set of traditions. But we are making traditions for ourselves now-a-days, and our descendants will refer to us as their wise forerethers, without the least doubt.
