Town Council Meeting.

Regular session on Tuesday evening, Aug. 9. All present.

Highway Committee reported that Overseer promises to do work on Line and other streets when he gets time; but Chairman proposes to do the work himself, if it is not done when his present job is finished.

Finance Committee reported progress on dog ordinance.

Law and Ordinance Committee reported that indestructible garbage had been collected and dumped in a good place on Twelfth Street.

Property Committee, doubting whether Town has any land on which to build a bath-house near the dam, have appointed a sub-committee to investigate.

Chief of Police reported a number of arrests during July, with fines in some cases.

Collector reported \$132.60 in taxes received last month.

Clerk reported amount received for licenses in July, \$40.50.

Collector reported sale of five parcels of land, for taxes.

Annual report of the Clerk of School District received and filed.

Supl. of the A. C. R. R., stated, in a letter, that his company owns 53 feet from centre line between tracks, hence is not responsible for condition of West End Avenue; but will send several cars of gravel after September 15th. Also promised to station a flagman at Thirteenth Street crossing.

Mr. King presented written protest against vacating sidewalks around Civic Club plot. Referred to Solicitor.

Petition presented, asking that Peach Street be extended from Central Avenue to Liberty Street. Voted, to instruct Mr. Bernshouse to survey the route, estimate cost of such extension, and report.

Petition read, asking Council to reconsider license petitions of Messrs. D'Giacomo and Heck, and to grant said licenses. Mr. Coggey questioned Council's right to do this. Matthew Jefferson, attorney for Mr. Heck, replied that such power was unquestioned, and made a plea for his client, stating that the place had been properly conducted; every requirement of State law and every rule of Council had been strictly complied with. Mr. Rogers favored D'Giacomo's application, and thought Council would do well to grant it. Mr. Digger favored same, and would vote for both if he knew that both would be granted, not otherwise. Mr. White moved that both applications be reconsidered; Mr. Coggey seconded the motion. Mayor J. M. Austin declared the motion out of order, and there was no appeal. After much debate and five minutes recess, quoting parliamentary law, etc., Mr. White moved that both petitions be referred to a special committee of three, who are to investigate the matter and report. This was car-

ried, and the Mayor appointed Messrs. Coggey, White and Digger, the other members of Council having declined to serve.

The ordinances yet under consideration were brought up, but final action deferred.

Orville Bassett, through the Clerk, protested against the dog nuisance. No action.

Clerk stated that Primary Elections will be held September 13th; that the last date for filing nominating petitions will be August 20th.

As primary election will be held on date of next Council meeting, it was voted that the September meeting be held on Wednesday evening, 14th. Adjourned at 10.05.

A N-ORDINANCE for the Regulation of places licensed in the Town of Hammononton for sale of intoxicating liquors and beverages.

Introduced June 14, 1910.

Passed July 21, 1910.

Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the Town of Hammononton in Court assembled, that on and after the fourteenth day of June, nineteen hundred and ten, the bars of all saloons, inns and taverns licensed within the Town of Hammononton shall be and remain closed between the hours of 11 p.m. and 6 a.m., and that between such hours no intoxicating liquors or beverages shall be sold, or otherwise disposed of, in or upon premises of such licensed saloons, inns and taverns.

Sec. 2. That any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine not exceeding ten dollars, or imprisonment for any more than ten days for each and every violation.

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance be, and the same are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately.

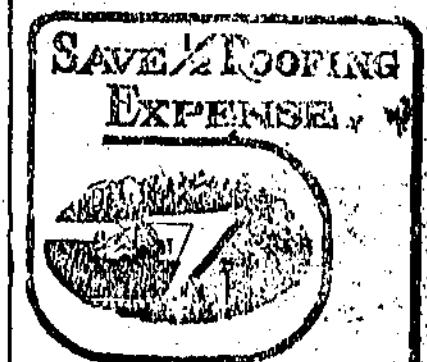
