THE CANTEN.

There is great activity among the
opponents to the "anti-canteen law." Every
little while we see some report, apparently
from some army post, telling the effect of the
enforcement of the law. That the men get worse
liquor outside the post, and there is more
drunkenness in consequence; but upon investigation
by our busy women, they prove to be untrue.

Where do these reports come from? If
followed to their source, they, or many of them,
would be found to be manufactured, as are the
campaign lies in a heated political contest.

One regiment sent to the Philippines from
Pennsylvania was divided up on arrival there, and
distributed around in different places, three
companies in one, three in another, and so on. In
one of these, only three men were reported in
hospital, sick; in another, with the same number
of men, nearly one-third of the men were sick. In
the former there was no canteen; in the latter
there was. This does not look as if liquor was
conducive to the health, or the canteen necessary
for the soldiers.

The navy officers can keep liquor from the
sailors—discipline is maintained there. Why is it
not the same in the army?

A prominent Congressman says: "The army
officers are not giving the anti-canteen law a fair
test. They are opposed to it, and are doing every-
thing possible to discredit it. They say with the
canteen closed the soldiers go to town and get
drunk. That when the canteens were open the sol-
diers would drink moderately, but now they drink
to excess. If this is true, why do not the com-
manding officers at posts prohibit the soldiers from
leaving the reservations? Soldiers cannot go to
town unless they are given permission. If a sol-
dier goes to town to get drunk, how easy it would
be for the officer to prohibit his going again. If the
army officers were in favor of the anti-canteen law,
they could do more than any other agency to
bring about sobriety in the army. Of course there
is talk about repealing the law, more especially
in army circles; but it will never be repealed
until given a fair trial. The American people still
believe they are more powerful than the army, and
they will not sit idly by and let the army crowd
the theory down their throats, that it takes liquor
to make a good soldier, or that a drinking man is
more patriotic than a temperance man."

Base-Ball.

In the closest and most exciting
game of the season, the local team
triumphed over the St. John's, of
Landsdowne, Penna., last Saturday.
It required eleven innings to decide
the contest, which was marked by
some sensational bits of fielding, and
hard hitting.

The fielding features of the visitors'
playing were a running catch by W.
Boyd, in centre, a difficult foul catch
by T. Hughes, and the all-around
work of Capt. C. Boyd. For the home
team, Thomas made a fine back run-
ning catch, as did also Helsor, while
Setley took in a grounder back of first
in good style.

Neither side scored until the fourth,
when the visitors gathered a run after
two were out, by an error and some
good hitting. The home boys scored
in the sixth inning, on a hit over the
fence. Not until the eleventh could
either team get a man across the plate,
the sides going out in one-two-three
order.

Hammon came to bat in their
half of the eleventh, determined to end the
contest. The first batter up hit to
left field, and was out at second, try-
ing to stretch the hit into a two-
bagger. The next man hit safely to
center, Corderly bunted and beat the
throw to first, P. Jefferson going to
third. It was then up to Herbert to
drive in the winning run. He hit the
first ball pitched squarely on the nose
and sent it sailing over the left field
fence, but the wind blew it foul. He
then hit a liner down the right field
foul line which also went foul by a
few feet. Finally he drove a screacher
to short, which Hughes very accom-
modatingly fumbled and Paul came
in with the deciding run.

A N ORDINANCE regulating and
directing the construction and re-
pair of sidewalks in the Town of Ham-
mon, within the territory bounded by
Main Road to Grand Street, and Fair-
view Avenue to Park Avenue, both sides
of all streets inclusive, and the materials
to be used in such construction and
repair, and appointing Commissioners to
carry this ordinance into effect.

Introduced June 29th, 1901.
Passed July 27th, 1901.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town
Council of the Town of Hammon, that all
owners of any lot, alley, or passage way
within the territory bounded by Main Road
to Grand Street, and Fairview Avenue to Park
Avenue, both sides of all streets inclusive,
shall, and they are hereby directed and re-
quired to repair the sidewalks in front of
or adjoining such lot, alley or passage way
within sixty days from the date this ordinance
shall take effect.

Sec. 2. Sidewalks shall be paved in whole
or in part with bluestone flagging, slate, brick,
cement, gravel, asphalt, or artificial stone.
The middle line of paving not covering the
entire sidewalk shall agree with the middle
line of the sidewalk. And all sidewalks shall
be of such width and thickness as the High-
ways Committee of Council shall direct. All
rules and regulations made by said Committee
shall be printed, and shall be made as to
secure a sidewalk of uniform width and simi-
larity of surface in each block between inter-
secting streets, and shall be made by virtue
of the authority hereby conferred, and subject
to all of the terms of this ordinance.

Sec. 3. Laomi Menfort, William J. Smith,
and Richard J. Byrnes shall be and are here-
by appointed as Commissioners to examine
into the matter of paving said sidewalks,
and they shall cause a map or survey to be
made of said improvements, distinguishing
each lot or parcel by number on said map;
and they shall estimate the whole cost of said
improvement according to the best of their
judgment, and shall assess such estimated
costs upon the said lands fronting on said
improvements, and report the names of the
owners of the lots or parcels as far as practi-
cable, with the amount assessed to each, and
shall file said report and map with the Clerk
of the Town within thirty days after their
appointment. The Clerk shall give notice of
the filing of any such report and map within
ten days after the same shall be filed with
him, in one of the Atlantic County newspapers
circulating in said Town, and notices put in
five of the most public places in said Town
for ten days; and unless within thirty days
after the filing of said report the owners of
two-thirds of the lands to be assessed for such
improvements shall file with the Clerk of the
Town a remonstrance signed by them or their
agent lawfully authorized, said Councilman
shall proceed to execute said improvement;
but if such remonstrance shall be filed, the
Councilman shall proceed no further in such
improvement under that application, and all
costs and expenses incurred by the Council in
such proceedings shall be paid to the Town by
such petitioners of such improvements; and
the Councilman may make such regulations
touching the receiving and proceeding upon
such petition, and security for the expenses
thereof, as they may deem proper.

Sec. 4. That all expenses and costs of pro-
ceedings and improvements provided for in
Sections 1, 2, and 3 of this ordinance, when
the same shall be completed, shall be assessed
by the three said commissioners upon the
land, and shall be paid by the owners of the
land and real estate fronting upon the said
improvements, in proportion to the benefit
received by said lands and real estate. And
the said Commissioners shall determine and
report in writing to the Board of Councilmen
what proportion of the said expenses shall be
assessed to each separate lot or parcel of land,
and shall accompany such report with a map
containing each lot assessed and the name of
the owner or owners, which report and map
shall be filed in the office of the Clerk of the
Town of Hammon, whereupon the Clerk
shall cause to be inserted in at least one of
the Atlantic County newspapers circulated in
said town, for at least twenty days, a notice
of the filing of said report, and shall also, for the
same length of time, put up the notices to view
of the most public places in town, and that
the Councilman shall meet at a time and place
to be specified in said notice, to be at least
twenty days from the date of filing of said
report, to consider said assessments, and to
receive and consider all objections which may
be presented in writing; and if the Councilman
shall confirm said assessment, it shall consti-
tute a lien upon the property for such assess-
ment, and be collected under and by virtue of
an ordinance or ordinances made by the said
Councilman for that purpose; and if the per-
sons assessed neglect to pay to the Town
Treasurer, upon written notice of the confir-
mation of the assessment and the passage of
the ordinance to collect the same, the amount
of their respective assessments, within thirty
days from the passage of said ordinance, the
said Councilman may proceed to enforce the
lien in the manner prescribed in this Act;
and whenever, within said Town, any assess-
ment on any lot or parcel of land shall remain
unpaid for thirty days after the confirmation
thereof by the Councilman, it shall be lawful
for said Councilman to charge, receive and
collect, in addition to the amount of said
assessment, interest thereon, to be computed
at the rate of twelve per centum per annum
from the time of confirmation of such assess-
ment until the same is paid.

Sec. 5. All ordinances or parts of ordi-
nances inconsistent with this ordinance be and
the same are hereby repealed.

Sec. 6. And be it ordained, that this ordi-
nance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE declaring the attendance of any person at the public schools of the Town of Hammonton who cannot show conclusive evidence of recent vaccination to Board of Health to be a menace to the public health, and prescribing the penalty therefor.

Introduced at meeting of the Town Council, May 25, 1901.

Passed by same June 29, 1901.

Section 1. Be it ordained and enacted by the Board of Health of the Town of Hammonton, that the attendance of any person at the public schools of the Town of Hammonton, who cannot show conclusive evidence of vaccination, to the Board of Health of said Town, is hereby declared a menace to the public health of the said town.

Sec. 2. That any person who cannot show conclusive evidence of vaccination to the Board of Health of the Town of Hammonton, shall be debarred from attending the public schools of the said town.

Sec. 3. That this ordinance shall take effect from the date of its final passage.
