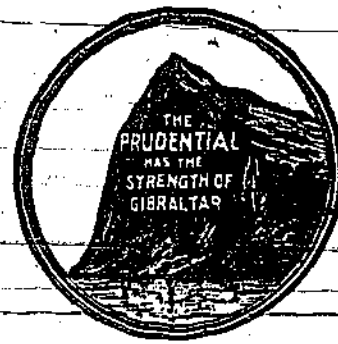

Town Council Meeting.

A special session was held on Tuesday evening, Aug. 17th. Mr. White was absent—sick.

The matter of appropriations for 1911 was the chief topic, and Council voted to recommend the following:

Street Lights,	4100
Poor,	1500
Fire,	300

Drainage,	800

\$16500

[The total appropriations for 1910 were \$15,700.]

The item of street lights caused much discussion. The electric company proposed to replace all the gas lights with electricity, and have the street lights burn all night; but this would require an appropriation of about \$5000, and a ten year contract, which was opposed.

Messrs. Baker, Coggey and Dilger voted for \$5000, leaving the contract question for a public meeting to decide. Messrs. Austin, Dilger, Rogers and Wood voted for \$4100.

Clerk was instructed to call a public meeting for Monday evening, August 22nd, in Town Hall.

By vote, the Rod and Gun Club were granted use of the Park on Saturday, 27th inst., for a clam bake.

Residents on Fifteenth Street asked for improvements to their roadway, said to be impassable in places. Referred.

By resolution, Mr. Bernshouse was authorized to make surveys for extension of Peach and Packard Streets and Wyman Avenue.

Committee reported finding no ground for a bath-house at the foot of the Lake, and recommended that the Town lease the basement of Drake's mill, which contains two large rooms, for twenty-five dollars per year, and expend about twenty-five dollars in repairs. This was referred to Property Committee, with power to lease for five years. Adjourned at 10:35.
